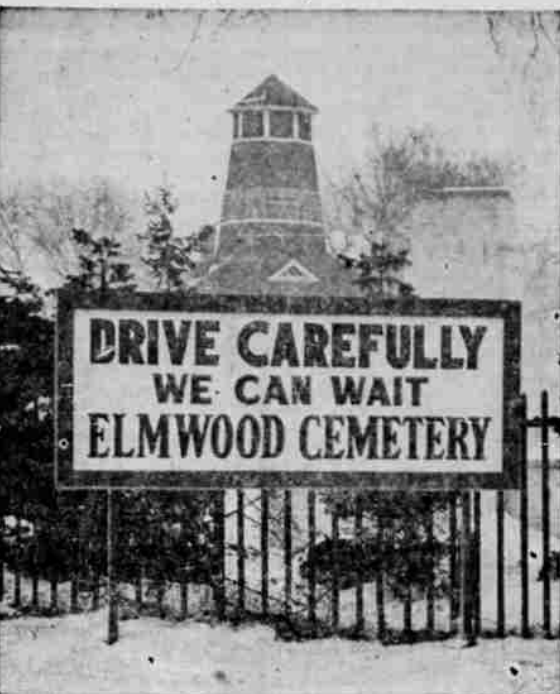

Leaves For Seattle—Mrs. T. W. Suckling of Roseburg left Wednesday for Seattle to spend several weeks visiting her daughter and family.

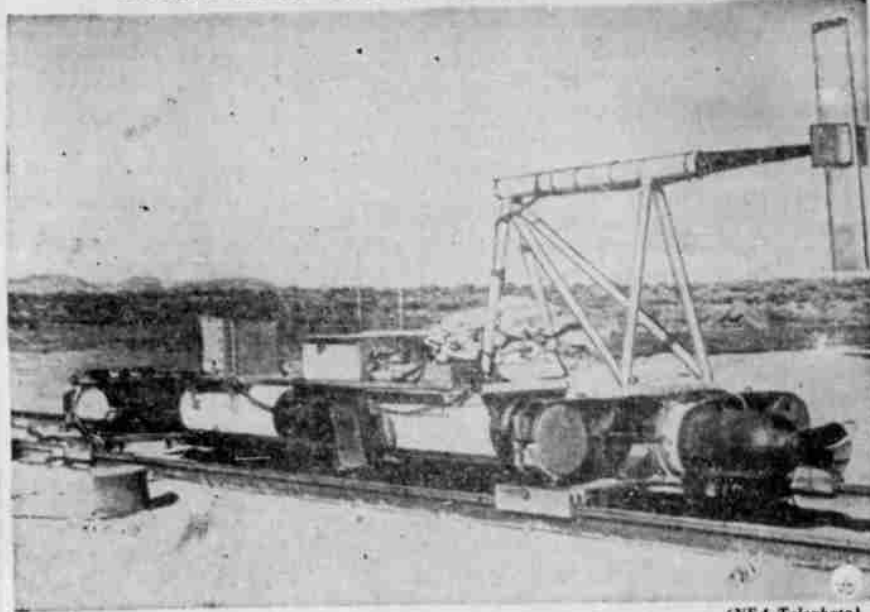
Fines Levied on Batch Of Traffic Violators

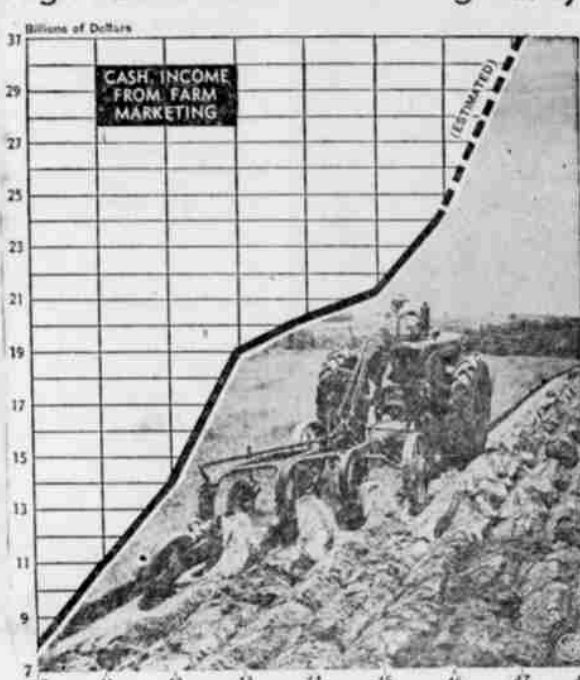

High Farm Prices Don't Bring Parity



The Department of Agriculture estimates that the 1947 total of cash receipts from farm marketing was over \$30,000,000,000, a record high, as shown on the chart. Nevertheless, the average income of farmers is less than that of city dwellers, and President Truman, in his State of the Union message, urged modernized price supports and extended crop insurance to help equalize the discrepancy.

Need of Larger Building Told By Salvation Army

Need for a new building for the Salvation Army in Roseburg was brought out at the annual meeting of the local advisory board at the Umpqua Hotel yesterday noon.

Capt. Claude Bowden, corps officer, said the Army is unable to meet the demands made upon it and to carry on its program in Roseburg, because of insufficient space in the present building.

He told the board that he visualized the construction of a community youth center, which would include a gymnasium and recreation hall, as well as a chapel and living quarters.

"Our greatest need in a growing city like Roseburg is a new building," he pointed out, "where the young people may have a directed recreation program under Christian guidance."

He said that offers received for the Salvation Army's property at 130 S. Jackson St. would provide a substantial part of the necessary funds for a new building.

Among the activities of the Salvation Army as listed in Capt. Bowden's annual report, was the expenditure of \$736.30 in local relief. The Army's 1947 budget called for \$400 to be spent on relief purposes.

Four hundred and thirty-five garments and pairs of shoes were given out. Two families were aided with groceries. Four families were provided with bedding and light furniture. One order was given for medicine.

Transient relief included transportation given to six persons. Lodging was given 93 people. Three hundred and thirty-five meals were served. One hundred and thirty-one garments and pairs of shoes were given. Aid was given to a total of 359 persons, of whom only three (special cases) were given cash.

At Christmas time, seven families were aided. Sixty-six children were given toys, candy, and fruit. Aid, including hospital work, was given to 148 persons.

Regular worship services are conducted each Sunday, with a total attendance of 4,850 persons in 1947 listed. Services include senior meetings and young people's gatherings. Three conversions were listed among the adults and more than 20 among the young people.

Young people's activities include a basketball team of 15-year-old boys who travel about the state, meeting other Salvation Army teams from various Oregon cities. Local basketball games are held at the Wilbur School gymnasium.

Five brass instruments have been purchased and eight young people are learning to play as the nucleus for a Salvation Army band. A string band also has been organized with seven young people learning the instruments.

Robert H. Franks and Kenneth W. Ford were elected to membership on the advisory board. Jack Fariss, Sr., continues as chairman.
