

Hayton Admits Killing His Third Wife

Then I put my hand on her throat, as I am showing you." (This was demonstrated on Captain Lyskowski.)

"I kept my hands on her throat," the statement continued, "until she became limp. I then took her in her present condition without clothes and put her in a white duffle bag, like the Army or Navy has, and then took her and put her in my car."

The swift turn in efforts to solve the two-week-old disappearance of Mrs. Hayton followed nearly nine hours of questioning during which Hayton admitted his story of a \$17,000 cache in the Blue Mountain foothills near here was a hoax.

Hayton told Lyskowski and Sands that he "took the money from that cache about three years ago" and hid it at his home in Seattle several months ago.

"I'm not sure it's there now," he added. "I haven't looked for it since because I saw suspicious men hanging around the house and watching my movements."

Lyskowski said Hayton would lead detectives today to the scene where he said he left the body of his wife.

PENDLETON, Ore., Jan. 22.—(AP)—R. L. Hayton was divorced from Alice S. Hayton here April 11, 1947. Umatilla county court records showed today.

Mrs. Hayton, second wife of the Seattle carpenter and retired merchant, did not contest the action. She was not served with papers and notice of the suit was given only through publication.

BREMERTON, Wash., Jan. 22.—(AP)—Deputy Sheriff Dean Jones reported today that efforts are being made to learn definitely the puzzling fate or whereabouts of the second wife of Roscoe Lee Hayton. She was last reported seen in Bremerton in 1945.

Officers said the second and third marriages followed matrimonial club acquaintanceships. Court records showed he obtained a divorce from wife No. 2, Alice Sarah, at Pendleton, Ore., last April 15, while the probate of her estate was stalled in court in Kitsap County, Wash., because of lack of sufficient proof of her death. The Pendleton divorce complaint alleged desertion.

Hayton had married her at Chehalis in 1925. The probate suit listed her death as having occurred Aug.

Morse Still Neutral On Boom for Eisenhower

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—(AP)—A deluge of letters prompted Senator Morse (R-Ore.) to tell the Senate yesterday that he has taken no position on the issue of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower and the presidency.

Morse told the Senate he had been "deluged" with inquiries about his position since he opposed a move by President Truman to name Maj. Gen. Laurence S. Kuter as chairman of the Civil Aeronautics Board. At the time he opposed Kuter he said he would be willing to vote for "any competent ex-military man."

The Oregon senator said he would take no position on the Eisenhower issue "until I know where he stands."

Morse said that "a great many progressives in America will show a great interest in Eisenhower if they find he shares their views."

"Offensive" On Way Against Greek Guerrillas

ATHENS, Jan. 22.—(AP)—News-papers reported today a "general offensive" was under way in Northern Greece against Greek guerrilla forces. Elements of six Greek

divisions were said to be attacking.

The dispatches were credited to military commanders in the field, but there was no immediate official confirmation.

Greek troops were said to have overrun guerrilla positions around Ardeha, eight miles south of the Yugoslav frontier and 60 miles northwest of Salonika. The advances said 35 dead guerrillas were found and 100 prisoners were taken. A large number of persons forcibly recruited were reported to have surrendered.

The standard basic food ration in the U. S. and British zones is 1,550 calories a day; heavy-industry workers are allotted more. (Nutrition authorities recommend 2,500 calories a day for a sedentary man.) Allied officials say these rations are hard to make because German farmers seem reluctant to help.

BERLIN, Jan. 22.—(AP)—Russian-controlled German newspapers featured today the statements of two U. S. Congress members advocating that Ruhr strikers be compelled to return to work, either by bayonets or through a "work or starve" policy.

The newspapers said these were the "Washington methods of solving" the western Germany food crisis.

The remarks were made by Rep. Richards (D-S. C.) and Rep.

Bolton (R-Ohio) of the House Foreign Affairs Committee. They insisted the Germans should be compelled to work for their own recovery.

Indictment as those of Oregon, are appointed by the President and confirmed by the Senate to terms of four years each.

"I believe it would be more desirable for the judges to have longer terms and that their selection should be taken out of politics," he said.

"As far as the judiciary is concerned, you can say that members of their bar and bench are of a very high type," he said.

In Hawaii's early days, members of the island's legal profession were New Englanders, products of Yale and Harvard, who recruited additions to their ranks from those schools. Members of the bar now represent all racial extractions—Japanese, Hawaiian, Chinese—the judge pointed out.

The University of Hawaii has no law school, because the number admitted to the bar each year is not large enough to justify the establishment of a law course.

"It is a very fine university," the judge said.

Various Groups Heard
As part of the Hawaiian statehood study, hearings were held in Honolulu, at which witnesses for more than a score of civic, fraternal and commercial organizations were heard.

Among them was Slaton Miller, former Roseburg resident, who is executive secretary for the Ha-

waiian Sugar Planters Association. Miller's father, the late M. M. Miller, was employed by the Roseburg News-Review.

Judge Wimberly said he was particularly impressed by the high school delegations, whose students of various races gave "excellent presentations," each with a different reason as to why Hawaii should be admitted to the Union.

As to the Hawaiians' interest in civic affairs, the judge commented that 85 per cent of the registered voters vote.

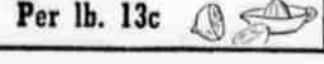
