

Alvin Williams' Funeral Friday

Funeral services for Alvin Allen Williams, 29, who was accidentally drowned Tuesday near Canyonville, in the Canyon Creek Lumber Co. millpond, will be held in the chapel of the Roseburg Home Friday, Jan. 23, at 2 P. M., with the Rev. Kenyon Knox officiating.

He was born July 20, 1918, in Malone, Wash., and had lived in Oregon for 20 years. He was a veteran of World War II, serving in Co. I 71st Infantry, and was a member of the Christian church.

Survivors are his wife, Beth, Myrtle Creek; his mother, Mrs. Grace Mundy, Portland; three brothers, George, Myrtle Creek, and Orville and Chester, both of Portland; two sisters, Evelyn Bell, Tallahassee, Ore., and Neoma Sewell, Morton, Wash., and two half-sisters, Theora Roudau, Cave Junction, and Sadie Belieu, Portland.

Interment will follow in the Masonic Cemetery in Roseburg.

Uno Leppanen, Reedsport Machinist, Passes Away

REEDSPORT—Uno Leppanen, 55, local machine shop operator for the past 27 years, died suddenly Tuesday at his Reedsport home, following a short illness.

He had recently returned home from McAuley Hospital, Coos Bay, where he had been confined by threatened pneumonia a week ago. He is survived by his widow, the former Ellen Sosa, of Reedsport; two sons, Leo of Eugene, Paul of Oakland, Calif., and one grandson, Stephen. Funeral services will be announced upon the arrival of the two sons.

Mr. and Mrs. Leppanen were both born in Finland. He came to this country in 1910, and in 1913, upon her arrival in the United States, they were married. Shortly thereafter they moved to Florence, and to Reedsport in 1918.

Alert Cafe Patron Turns In Escaped German POW

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 22.—(P)—The Federal Bureau of Investigation was expressing thanks today to "a very alert citizen" who downed a hamburger at a midtown sandwich shop and then while noting a package at the post office immediately afterward recognized a picture of an escaped German prisoner of war as the counterman who served him his food.

FBI Chief Gerald B. Morris said the prisoner, captured in North

Africa in May, 1943, escaped in January, 1946, and had been using an assumed name picked from an obituary in a New York newspaper.

Scarce Items Must Be Given Europe—Marshall

ATLANTA, Ga., Jan. 22.—(P)—Secretary of State Marshall said here today that sharing farm machinery and fertilizers with Europe under the proposed recovery program "may cause some hardship for a few American farmers." But he said the sacrifices here will be "insignificant" in comparison with the job to be done.

"They are minor when measured against the alternatives—the situation that would face American agriculture if the structure of world trade and social order should collapse," he pointed out.

The secretary said that scarce items which would have to be shipped to Europe despite need

in this country will include small amounts of nitrogen fertilizer, farm machinery and other supplies and equipment necessary to enable Europe to increase its indigenous food supply.

Water Jobs Too Late; Business Buildings Burn

MAYSVILLE, Okla., Jan. 22.—(P)—The stitch that saves nine wasn't quite in time for this small Oklahoma oil town of 1,800—where a half-block of business buildings still smoldered yesterday after a disastrous night fire.

The town recently voted bonds for a new pumper fire engine—which isn't delivered yet.

It also let a contract for a new water supply—and well drilling, only started Monday.

Last night, volunteer firemen turned their hose-cart hose on a small blaze in the back of the Granada theatre.

Nothing happened... the wa-

ter had failed.

"We stood and watched it burn," said owner Sam Ridgeway. "A hundred gallons would have stopped it."

PET BUTTER SPREAD

Broadcast January 24, 1948

1/2 lb. butter or margarine

1/4 teaspoon salt 1/2 cup Pet Milk

Cut butter in small pieces.

Add 1/4 teaspoon salt.

Put in mixing bowl. Let stand in warm

room until soft enough to stir with a

spoon—as easily as mayonnaise (see

note).

Let milk stand in warm room also.

Butter and milk will blend better if

they are the same temperature.

Stir milk into soft butter gradually,

adding 2 tablespoons at a time using

mixing spoon, rotary egg beater or

electric beater at low speed. When all

milk is added, beat vigorously 1 minute

to blend completely.

Cover bowl and chill, or pack while

soft into straight-sided dish. Keep

chilled when not in use.

Serve as spread on bread, pancakes,

waffles, biscuits, muffins, etc. Makes

a little less than 2 cups (1 lb.).

NOTE: If kitchen or weather is cool, place

bowl containing butter in large bowl or

pan half filled with hot water, stirring but-

ter at 10 minute.
