Major Parties Challenged By Drys' Candidate

America's "third party" candidate for president spoke to an audience of 50 people at the First Methodist Church last night, challenging major parties to adopt the "moral yardstick" represented by the planks of the Prohibition platform.

Dr. Claude A. Watson of Los Angeles, the candidate, told his listeners that "the political parties in power today are definitely accountable and morally responsible for the kind of government they give us."

A man with a sense of humor, Dr. Watson said, yes, he "fully expected" to be elected president and jokingly told a reporter in his hotel room yesterday afternoon that Mrs. Watson, who was obviously catching up on her correspondence, "is making plans for the White House."

Dr. Watson refutes any claim that Henry A. Wallace may have to represent the "third party." Actually, Dr. Watson points out, the Prohibition Party, organized in 1869, is the third party and many of the causes it first championed were later adopted by the major political parties.

The presidential candidate was introduced last night by the Rev. Walter A. MacArthur, pastor of the church, with whom he was acquainted a few years ago when MacArthur was a student at the Los Angeles Pacific college; MacArthur's then future wife was secretary to the president, and both had met Dr. Watson, a member of the Free Methodist Church and with which the college is associated.

The Rev. Kenneth Harger, pastor of the Roseburg Free Methodist Church, delivered the opening prayer at last night's meeting.

Vote Major Weapon
"May I say to you, my friends, that the powerful weapon any Christian has in a democracy is his vote," Dr. Watson said in his address. "Your vote is mighty powerful weapon."

"No, my friends," he continued "you do not lose your vote simply because you vote for someone who may not be elected to office. You lose your vote when you do not vote your God-given convictions as to what this country would be if all the other voters voted just like you."

"If I, as a Christian, support a political party that supports and aids, as a matter of policy, the practice of debauching the citizens of this country and I do it knowingly, if I walk up and give it my support and my political allegiance when I know that it is hand in hand with the anti-social forces of this country,

then my friends, I am definitely as guilty morally as the man who perpetrates the deed," Dr. Watson declared.

He explained that the Prohibition Party is against the "commercialized liquor traffic" of the nation, which drains away billions of dollars from other enterprises. "Some day the businessmen of Roseburg are going to wake up and put a stop to it."

As to the drinking habits of the American people, Dr. Watson commented, "I don't propose to dry up the Mississippi at its mouth with a blotter."

Pilots Own Plane
Dr. Watson, whose doctoral degrees are for attainments in the legal field, is the head of a law firm of eight persons who specialize in probate work and automobile damage cases, he said.

He has piloted his own airplane, a Stinson Voyager, more than 20,000 miles in his campaign tours, as well as traveling more than 100,000 miles on the ground. His wife does not fly, but is often his passenger in the plane.

Dr. Watson expects to be the first presidential candidate to pilot his own plane in a landing on the Roseburg airport. He said he will be back in a few weeks, to attend the nominating assembly at Cascade College in

"Voice of America" Sent Out in 24 Languages

NEW YORK, Jan. 23.—(AP)—The international broadcasting division of the State Department said yesterday the "Voices of America" is broadcasting news summaries of the department's report on Russian-German relations during 1939-41 in 24 languages.

A spokesman said the first report to Russia was being broadcast today in a summary of approximately two minutes.

The broadcasts are made in 14 languages to Europe, seven to the Far East and three to Latin America, the spokesman said. News summaries will be followed by news analyses of the report over a period of several days.
