

Lynam Hopes To Regain Prestige In Tilt With Dusette

Actually Joe Lynam has nothing to be ashamed of, but the talented native-born Oregonian has asked Matchmaker Don Owen to book him for a return match in Roseburg this week to "get the bad taste out of my mouth, and show Douglas County fans that I'm capable of giving a creditable performance."

Lynam was the victim of Frankie Stojack's airplane spin Saturday. And after the new coast junior heavyweight tilted whirled him around no less than 40 turns, Lynam was an easy victim in the final fall—lasting only a minute, Joe, however, displayed fine form in the opening fall, dumping the talented champ for the count, and he hopes to make a good showing in one of the two one-hour headlines Saturday at the Armory arena—against Georges Dusette.

The French-Canadian and the former Australian champ are expected to stage one of the finest scientific battles of the winter season—a bout that will be on a par with the other main-event between Joe Dorsett and Buck Weaver.

Dorsett, the New York Italian, has offered to meet any man who can make the 180-pound limit in a title tilt—despite his loss to Tex Hager here last week. The rugged Easterner, who copped the crown from Billy Hixon in Salem recently, is not risking his title against Weaver, however. Weaver is one of the top men in the division. The flying backward leap, used effectively by the

ex-Indiana University football end, is one of the most feared holds in the sport. The match will likely be a rough and tough tilt, in marked contrast to the other one-hour skirmish.

Elton Owen will be on hand to referee the two mat bouts. The opener gets under way at 8:30 p.m., but he will have nothing to do with the "Alligator Man" and the exhibition coming between the two bouts.

Tuffy Trusdale, the ex-Florida wrestler who retired to enter the alligator business, will enter the ring—securely caged in from the fans—with the gigantic reptile and will demonstrate how to handle the 1200-pound beast without getting bitten or slapped by its sharp tail. He will not attempt to wrestle the alligator, however, and will give a lecture during the exhibition. It is not only a spectacle, but also an educational feature.

Amanda M. Cole Of Canyonville Dies

Amanda Melvina Cole, 86, well known resident of Canyonville for the last 36 years and of Douglas County for 52 years, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Elizabeth Atterbury, 327 Fullerton St., Roseburg, Jan. 22.

Mrs. Cole was born at Mauston, Wis., Nov. 17, 1861. She was married to Asa Cole in Minnesota on May 23, 1879. In 1885 they moved to Douglas County, residing at various times at Leona, Winchester, and Oakland.

In 1901 they moved to Wisconsin, where they made their home until their return to Douglas County in 1911, when they located at Canyonville. Mr. Cole died in 1919. Mrs. Cole was a member of the Seventh Day Adventist Church.

Surviving are a daughter, Mrs. Elizabeth Atterbury, Roseburg; two sons, Clarence Cole, Glendale and Walter Cole, Canyonville; 12 grand children, 12 great-grandchildren, and one great-great-grandchild.

Funeral services will be held in the chapel of the Long & Orr Mortuary Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Elder J. J. Robertson of the Seventh Day Adventist Church will officiate. Interment will follow in the Odd Fellows Cemetery, Oakland.

Siftings Saved In New Flour Method

PULLMAN, Wash. — (AP)—A new experimental whole wheat flour which utilizes all the wheat constituents usually sifted out during milling has been developed at the Washington State Institute of Technology, Dr. William A. Pearl, director, said.

Grinding of the flour involves only one operation, Dr. Pearl said. Wheat is hurtled through a high speed grinding wheel once, then blown into a fabric bag where the flour settles.

Customary screening out of bran, shorts and wheat germ is eliminated, he said. The process may be less expensive than usual operations. Also it produces 100 pounds of flour from 100 pounds of wheat. Normally millers get 72 pounds of wheat flour from 100 pounds of wheat.

The new process may utilize more fully the low-protein wheat grown in Washington state, Dr. Pearl added. Millers now import high-protein Montana and Dakota wheat to blend with Washington's soft wheats.
