Twenty years ago we produced a surplus and had to find a market for it on the Atlantic seaboard. Now we produce only about two-thirds of our egg requirements.

We used to figure egg prices on "New York, less the freight." Now we figure them "Chicago, plus the freight." Today Portland egg prices average higher than New York prices.
