Hayton Now Grilled in Mattson Kidnap-Murder

thorities the gun he said was used in shooting his second wife, Sarah Alice Lane Hayton, in

1945, near Bremerton, Wash.

Hayton confessed slaying his second wife Saturday night several hours after taking authorities to her grave at the foot of a tree south of Bremerton.

Prior to making his signed confession, Hayton had given several versions of the second wife's death. One of these was that she died in West Virginia while visiting relatives.

Both his second and third wives were met through matrimonial clubs, he told authorities.

First Murder Described

Authorities quoted Hayton as saying he shot the second Mrs. Hayton in the back of the head in a gravel pit a few hundred yards down the backwoods logging road from where she was buried.

The grave, about three feet deep, was beside the upturned roots of a fir tree.

Lyskowski handed Hayton a shovel and the man calmly started to dig. When he uncovered part of the body, the officers stopped him and they returned to Belfair to await the Mason County coroner.

The body was clad in slacks and a blouse, and a rope was found around the neck. Hayton explained he had placed the rope around his wife's body to drag it from the car. The second Mrs. Hayton weighed more than 200 pounds.

In a signed statement, Hayton said he and his second wife had quarreled on the day of the slaying. Hayton couldn't recall the exact date but said he knew it was August because that is the month of his birthday.

"I pulled my car to the side of the road and into a gravel pit," the statement said. "My wife jumped out of the car to grab a club and I just grabbed the gun and shot her in the back of the head."

Hayton said the murder weapon was a .32-20 calibre rifle. Lyskowski said he saw this weapon Thursday in Hayton's home in Lake City, when Hayton reenacted the strangling of his third wife.

Franc Value Slash Averts French Crisis

more francs for their dollars than they have been getting.

Up to midnight, the franc was officially quoted at 110 to \$1. The new rate is 214 for \$1, but exporters will be able to realize even more than that. They will trade half their dollars at the 214-1 rate, and the other half at a newly created free market, currently around 337 francs to the dollar.

This free market also will be open to tourists. France hopes this action and the benefits to exports will bring her more dollars for purchase of essential goods abroad. The object is to attain French recovery before prices rise too much at home, as they are bound to do.

This Paris stock market as a whole was calm today. French government bonds, gold and free currencies showed declines. Many French industrial and international stocks were higher.

LONDON, Jan. 26.—(AP)—Sir Stafford Cripps declared today Britain does not contemplate devaluing the pound despite French action in cutting the value of the franc.

"We do not believe that this will be rendered necessary or advisable," the chancellor of the exchequer advised the House of Commons. Earlier government securities had dipped on the stock exchange, reflecting investors' fears that France's action will damage the pound sterling.

ported with Mobile, Ala., which recorded 22 above Sunday having a 34-degree minimum today. Milder weather was expected to reach the south Atlantic coast by Tuesday night.

Another storm, developing in the Southwest, had brought snow and freezing rain to Texas and was moving eastward across the southern states, already chilled by snow and sub-freezing temperatures over the weekend.

Meanwhile, little or no relief was in sight for New England and other eastern seaboard states where some points were digging out of an accumulation

of snow measuring more than 20 inches.

Chill weather also continued on the West coast, with temperatures generally in the 20's. Fresno, Calif., had an early low of 44 today, and San Francisco 47. The new cold wave across the north central states would moderate and have little to sting the Great Lakes region, the weather bureau said. Temperatures in Chicago were expected to remain well above zero.

While the rest of the nation shivered yesterday, public beaches in Miami, Fla., reported their largest turnout of the season with a sunny 75-degree day.

"Disc Jockeys" Paid More Than Musicians, Claim

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—(AP)—An attorney for James C. Petrillo said here that "Disc Jockeys" who play records on radio broadcasts, earn as much as \$185,000 a year while the musicians who make the recordings "fight for scraps."

Milton Diamond, general counsel for Petrillo's American Federation of Musicians, told the House Labor Committee that musicians in this country "potentially commit suicide" when they permit their performances to be recorded.

Defending Petrillo's ban on further record making by union musicians, Diamond said that at the federation's last convention in June, 1947, the entire delegation of all union locals "voted unanimously" to halt recordings.

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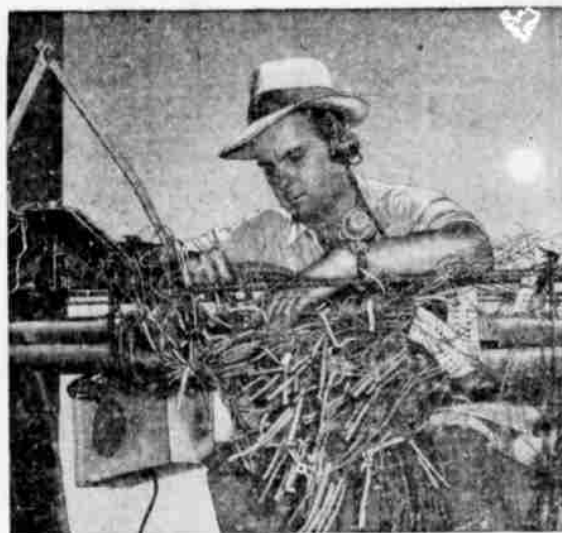
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
