The "Ten Little Indians" of the Roseburg High School basketball team travel westward this weekend to trade shots with the so-far undefeated Coos Bay Pirates in a couple of games which may be crucial ones for both teams. The Coos Bay team is at the top of the league with 9 wins and 0 losses, and still has most of its players from last year's championship team.

The Indians have won all except their first two games (both with North Bend), one of which they lost by one point and the other by two. And North Bend, in turn, lost two games to Myrtle Point, a school which Roseburg trimmed twice later in the season. Counsellor For T-B Hospitals In Oregon Sought

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 27. —UP—The Oregon Tuberculosis and Health Association asked the State Board of Control today to adopt a program to rehabilitate patients at the State Tuberculosis Hospitals at the Dalles and Salem.

Dr. J. M. Odell, superintendent of the hospital at the Dalles, said the program would reduce the number of patients who return to the tuberculosis hospitals.

The plan, submitted by Mrs. Saide Orr Dunbar, secretary of the Association, calls for employment of a rehabilitation counsellor who would get \$5,000 a year.

She said 46 per cent of the patients discharged from the institution at The Dalles return for further treatment, while the figure for the Salem institution is 33 per cent.

She said that since most of those who return are forced to go back because they can't get jobs or adjust themselves. The rehabilitation counsellor could give them much help. She said employment of the counsellor would save the state money.

The board said it would study the proposal.

The board authorized sale of the Thayer home, located on the site of the proposed \$2,000,000 state office building. It has reject plans to move the house and use it for a governor's mansion because it would cost \$35,000 to buy a site and move it.

Glendale High Five Posts 35-to-34 Win Over Myrtle Creek
Glendale High School's basketball quintet edged out Myrtle Creek Friday at Myrtle Creek by a 35-34 margin, after coming up from a 12-2 deficit early in the first quarter. Myrtle Creek led all the way until the last quarter, when Bob Fisher, high point man with 19 tallies, came through to bring the Glendale team from a 31-34 disadvantage to a one-point win.

LONDON.—(AP)—The fabulous crown jewels of England, said to have an intrinsic value of \$25,000,000 have been taken from their wartime hiding place and are again on display in the Tower of London.

The last great state occasion in which the jewels were used was the coronation of the present King George VI.

"Wild Bill" Apter Draws 15 Years

PENDLETON, Ore., Jan. 28.—(AP)—Donald Merle Dyer, 18, yesterday pleaded guilty to assault and armed robbery charges before Circuit Judge Homer I. Watts and was sentenced to 15 years in the state prison.

Dyer, who was known as "Wild Bill Hickok" to his schoolmates, had a record of "petty" crimes since he was 12, records showed. He and two other Milton-Freewater area boys were arrested Thursday for the robbery Wednesday night of an Athena filling station and wounding of the owner, A. J. Queener.

The other two boys — Ralph Price, 18, and his 15-year-old brother James—were held for the grand jury under \$15,000 bond each.

No mention was made in the charges of the robbery earlier Wednesday of a Pendleton woman, Mrs. Blanche Tower, of 82. The Athena holdup netted the trio about \$80. Mrs. Tower identified Dyer for state police and he named the Price boys.
