For four hours last night officials of the Chester local of the AFL Union and the School's Band Association conferred on means of removing the band from the union's unfair list. They reached a tentative agreement for submission to the association.

The dispute, which bounced in to the halls of Congress last week, arose when the 85-member band accepted an offer of \$125 to march in the Thanksgiving day firemen's parade after a Chester union had bid \$10 a man, a total of \$280, for the job.

## American Oral Duel With Russia Gets Legal Status

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—(AP)—President Truman yesterday signed legislation giving legal backing for the "Voice of America" radio weapon in the State Department's duel of words with Russia. The program, by which the department broadcast counter-Soviet propaganda to foreign countries, has been operated in the past on a year-to-year basis but has lacked a permanent statutory footing. Currently it is financed with a \$12,000,000 appropriation which Congress soon will be asked to raise by \$5,000,000.

The legislation signed yesterday cleared the Senate and House without a dissenting vote, scores of congressmen who visited Europe last summer reporting they found the United States on the losing end of the propaganda war with Russia.

Backers of the program plan to ask Congress for an appropriation of \$50,000,000 for the fiscal year starting July 1.

The main purpose of the "voice" program, beamed to Soviet-dominated countries as well as to non-Soviet nations, is to acquaint foreign people with the aims and objectives of the United States and this country's role in world affairs.

The new legislation provides for a dual program with educational and informational features. It authorizes the State Department to arrange for the exchange with other nations of students, teachers, technicians and "persons, knowledge and skills" and to set up abroad information centers at which foreigners may learn more about the United States.
