## Striped Bass Issue Slated For Hearing

### Fish Board Calls Public Meet Following Ruling Affecting Its Authority

Public notice is being given by the Oregon Fish Commission of a hearing to be held in Portland, Wednesday, Feb. 11, at 10 A. M. in the commission's offices in the Governor's building, to consider "The striped bass fishery in the Umpqua River and tributaries; its regulation and management." Interested parties, the Commission reports, will have the privilege of presenting their views regarding the matter. Statements and facts pertaining to the fishery may be submitted orally or in writing. Written communications should be mailed in time to be received prior to the scheduled hearing.

The Fish Commission's action follows a recent opinion furnished at the commission's request by Attorney General George Neuner outlining the Commission's powers over the striped bass fishery. The opinion was written by Fred A. Miller, assistant attorney general, who, upon instructions from Neuner, has been making a special study of the Umpqua fishery laws and regulations, in which several conflicts, resulting from passage of two bills, Senate Bill 316, and Senate Bill 340, by the last legislature have had both the Fish Commission and Game Commission in a quandary as to their respective powers.

**Authority Clarified**  
The Fish Commission had assumed that S. B. 140, the Authority Bill, gave that body complete authority over the salmon fishery, both sports and commercial, but the Attorney General ruled recently that authority over sports angling for salmon still remains with the Game Commission, and that the Fish Commission can regulate only the commercial fishery. Senate Bill 316, the Umpqua Closure Act, makes salmon in the Umpqua River a game fish, except when taken as "incidental catch" but permits gillnetting for striped bass. Through oversight, resulting from haste in crowding the bill thru the legislature in closing days of the session, the Act failed to provide needed limitations. It omitted, for instance, any provision for deadlines, "incidental catch" was not defined, and no striped bass seasons were set.

The opinion furnished from the office of the Attorney General holds that Senate Bill 140, now Chapter 438, Oregon Laws 1947,

has for its primary purpose the promotion of the "propagation and conservation of fish," authorizing and commanding the State Fish Commission to "promulgate rules and regulations governing the times and places, means or manner of taking, catching or fishing for striped bass and other valued food fish and tends only to accomplish the primary objective, namely, to prevent impairment of the ultimate supply of all valued food fish, including striped bass."

**Intent Clearly Shown**  
The opinion shows a vast amount of research and study into the history of legislation affecting the Umpqua River, listing continued effort, since 1891, for protection of the resource. It is pointed out that the intent of the legislature is clearly expressed in Chapter 356, Oregon Laws 1945, in which the Fish and Game Commissions were directed to make studies and submit recommendations to "conserve all of the valued food fish of this state for the greatest number of people for the greatest length of time."

The Fish Commission, being given the responsibility for protection, preservation, propagation, cultivation, development and promotion of the Oregon fishery,

and furnished with "exclusive jurisdiction" over all shad, striped bass, sturgeon, etc., has authority, the opinion holds, to govern "the taking, possession, sale and disposition" of striped bass; the right to set seasons and deadlines, but is bound by the provisions contained in the Umpqua Closure Act, which sets the size of nets to be used.

## Carnegie Hero Medal Given Oregon City Man

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Jan. 29.—(AP)—The Carnegie hero fund commission has awarded one of 10 bronze medals for heroism to Ellis Pudwill, Route 3, Oregon City.  
The commission announced that Pudwill, 33, an electrician, saved Genevieve J. Kay, 22, from drowning at Fargo, N. D., on June 14, 1947, when she fell into the Red River while fishing.  
The citation said that the Oregon man, although just previously hospitalized and still weakened from his illness, had swam fully clothed to where she disappeared in the swift current. He finally succeeded in reaching Mrs. Kay and towing her to near the river bank where others helped bring her ashore.

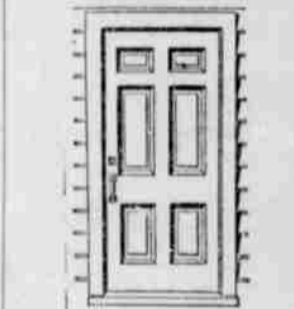

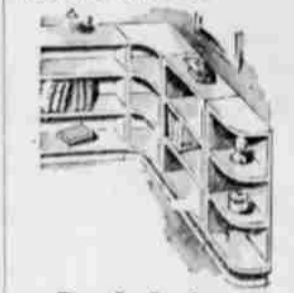
