Kin of Roseburg Men Dies in Fire

Rhinehart Scherner, one of the two men who died in a house fire on the Garden Home road near Portland Wednesday morning,

was a brother of Fred Scherner, Sr., janitor at Roseburg Senior High School, and an uncle of Fred Scherner, Jr., and Bill Scherner, operators of a local bottling plant. He was 50 years of age and a logger by occupation.

The other victim of the fire was William Rice, 68, owner of the house, a long-time friend of Scherner, who was his over-night visitor. Cause of the fire was listed as "unknown," although neighbors said Rice customarily put kindling in the oven of his cook stove to dry out.

Poland Plans Military Training on Big Scale

WARSAW, Jan. 29.—A law expected to pass parliament today provides for broad mobilization for military training of youths and undrilled men up to 30.

The official press agency disclosed that the "Sluzba Polaca" statute creating a government-directed national youth organization provided compulsory military training not only for youths in the 16-21 age brackets but also for men of more advanced years.
