Funeral services will be held in Stayton Saturday afternoon. The Rev. Willard Buckner, pastor of the Baptist Church there, will officiate.

Three U. S. Women, Five Children On Lost Plane

FRANKFURT, Germany, Jan. 29.—(AP)—All available American aircraft in Germany joined today in the search for a transport plane missing more than 48 hours with three American women and five children passengers.

Airforce headquarters here said no clue to its whereabouts had been reported. The plane took off from Istres, France to Udine, Italy Tuesday around noon. Search was concentrated in Southeast France and Northern Italy. The women and children were dependents of American servicemen in the Trieste area and had arrived in Europe Saturday from the United States.

Students Burn Copy 14th Amendment

NORMAN, Okla., Jan. 29.—(AP)—Students demonstrating against the ban on admission of Negroes to the University of Oklahoma today burned a copy of the 14th amendment to the constitution and mailed the ashes to President Truman.

The campus demonstration was held before class work opened for the second semester and followed the denial of education at the University Law School to Mrs. Ada Lois Sipuel Fisher, 23-year old Negro, on the grounds that the state provided for a separate school established at Oklahoma City.

The board of regents of the University was called into emergency session here today to decide the course of action to be taken on the application of six negroes for enrollment.

The Negroes submitted their applications yesterday to Dr. George L. Cross, university president, who referred the matter to the Board of Regents and the State Regents for Higher Education.

Oklahoma's constitution provides for segregation of Negroes and Whites in schools, but a recent U. S. Supreme Court decision held the state must provide equal educational facilities for both races.

The supreme court ruling came in the appeal of Mrs. Fisher, who applied for admission to the law school of the university.

dent himself has been "amazingly inconsistent" on the tax issue. Mr. Truman has given every sign that he will veto any measure along the lines of Knutson's. Instead, he has suggested a \$40-a-person "cost of living" tax cut. To balance this, he asked \$3,200,000,000 of new taxes on corporations.

Pruning Indicated

Before the debate began, Speaker Martin said an income tax cut this year is in the bag.

He conceded it might not be as much as the \$6,500,000,000 provided in the Knutson bill which came up today.

But in the end, Martin told reporters, the Republican Congress will override a presidential veto of the tax bill we send to the White House.

This was taken to mean that Senate Republicans will tone down the House measure to attract Democratic support. The GOP will need some to round up the two-thirds majority necessary to overcome a veto.

The party lineup in the House is 245 Republicans, 185 Democrats. In the Senate it is 51 Republicans to 45 Democrats.

idle in Cincinnati and more than 8,000 others in several other Ohio cities. Also made temporarily jobless when industries closed were workers in Buffalo and Little Falls, N. Y.

Service to all industrial users, schools and most commercial establishments in 333 Texas and Oklahoma towns was cut off by the Lone Star State Gas Company. In the Kansas City area of Missouri and Kansas gas also was shut off from 900 industrial users.

Heavy Toll in Texas

Snow, sleet and rain still fell in parts of Texas and temperatures ranged from near zero in the Panhandle to 20 to 30 in the southeast. The mercury dropped to six below yesterday in Dalt, in the Panhandle region, and Brownsville, at the southern tip, shivered in 28 above.

The death toll in Texas from the inclement weather was 11. Huge losses of livestock were feared in West Texas and along the Gulf coast and a further drop in temperatures in the Rio Grande valley was expected to cause heavy crop damages.

Unseasonable cold was reported in both northern and southern California. Los Angeles yesterday

Tax Slashes For Subversives Hit

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—(AP)—

Senator Ball (R-Minn.) said today the treasury is okaying in good tax deductions for donations to eight groups labeled "subversive" by the Attorney General. The Senator described all eight as "Communist fronts."

Ball said his office staff found the organizations among 81 listed by Attorney General Clark last November 23 as "subversive"—opposed to our kind of government.

They also appear, he told a reporter, on a treasury list of "charitable, religious, scientific, literary or educational organizations." This makes contributions to them tax-free.

A treasury official said the department has no power to separate the "good" from "bad" organizations when making up its tax deductible list. It merely follows definition in the law which Congress passed, he said.

But Ball said the treasury is "very tough" about denying deductions for many other organizations "with only the slightest political tinge."

Ball identified the eight groups as: Joint Anti-Fascist Refugee Committee; National Council of American-Soviet Friendship; Hollywood Writers' Mobilization; International Workers Order; Ohio School of Social Sciences; Cleveland, Ohio; Philadelphia School of Social Sciences; Samuel Adams School, Boston, Mass.; and School of Jewish Studies, New York City.

Stassen Predicts Win, Challenges Gov. Dewey

PORTLAND, Me., Jan. 29.—(AP)—

Harold E. Stassen today predicted a republican victory in this year's presidential election "with or without a Henry Wallace third party candidacy."

Stassen did not elaborate but he said reports from across the country on his own candidacy for the GOP presidential nomination were "very encouraging."

Swinging along in a week long tour of New England, Stassen said Maine and Connecticut "are two of my strongest states."

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Elmer A. Benson, of Appleton, Minn., former Minnesota governor and U. S. Senator is chairman. Benson is a leader of the democratic-farmer labor party, the official democratic party of Minnesota.

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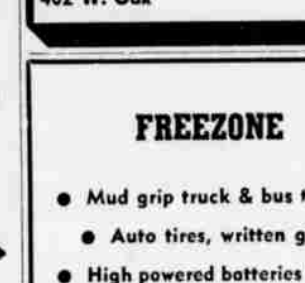
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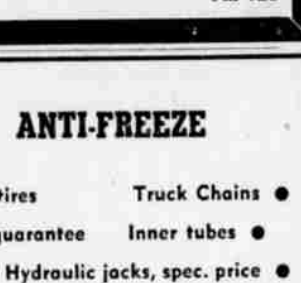
