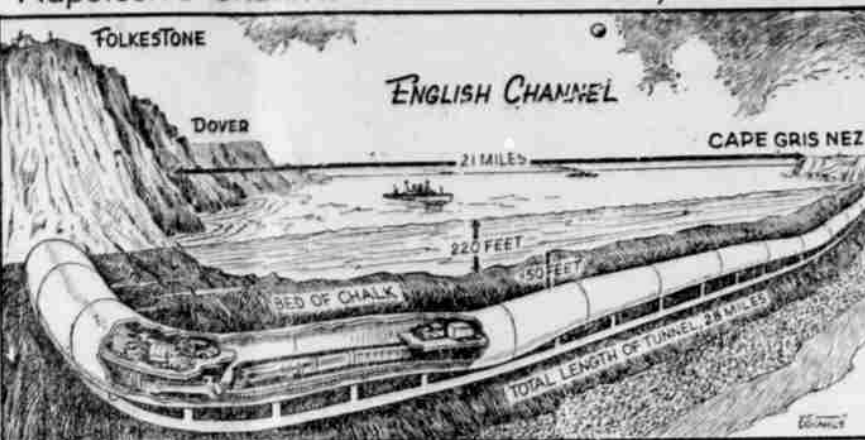
FORMER DAYS CREEK RESIDENT MARRIES

Napoleon Bonaparte's dream of a tunnel under the English Channel may soon be a reality. Britain and France have once again started conferring on the possibility of a bomb-resistant underground tube linking the two nations. The project, as outlined by a joint commission, calls for a 28-mile tunnel between Folkestone, England, and Cape Gris Nez, France, large enough for two automobile roads and two electric train tracks. Ram Jet Engine Missile Attains Supersonic Speed

NAVY ORDONANCE TEST STATION, Inyokern, Calif., Feb. 3.—(AP)—A missile propelled by the largest ram jet engine ever flown has attained supersonic speed on its first test flight, the Navy says.

The nature of the missile was not disclosed nor was the speed it reached. However, a Navy spokesman said the speed was "far into the supersonic range."

The Navy said the huge ram jet, nicknamed the "Flying Stovepipe," developed a thrust greater than combined horsepower of the largest four-engine planes.

The ram jet, a duct open at both ends with no moving parts, is first boosted to supersonic speed by a rocket which then falls off, leaving the unit to continue under its own power.

Three-R Slogan Kicked Back On G. O. P. in 1888

WASHINGTON.—Sometimes the most popular slogan in a political campaign has nothing to do with the election.

For example, the campaign of 1912 is best remembered for the widely popularized remark of Thomas R. Marshall, Democratic vice presidential candidate, who said "What this country needs is a good five-cent cigar."

Woodrow Wilson, victorious Democratic candidate for president, won on the slogan "The Government has been used too long for private and selfish purposes." He defeated Theodore Roosevelt with "My Hat's in the Ring" as his slogan on the Progressive ticket; William Howard Taft, Republican, and Eugene V. Debs, Social Democrat.

Roosevelt campaigned on "The New Nationalism" and coined the phrase "The Square Deal."

War has given rise to many political slogans. "He Kept Us Out War," helped win the 1916 election for Wilson.

"Back to Normalcy" Warren G. Harding's "Back to Normalcy" helped put the Republicans in power in 1920, when he defeated Democrat James E. Cox and the Social Democrat, Eugene V. Debs.

"Keep Cool with Coolidge" urged the Republicans in 1924. They won with Calvin ("Silent Cal") Coolidge over Democrat James W. Davis and Progressive Robert M. LaFollette.

One of the chief issues of the 1928 campaign, when Republican Herbert Hoover defeated Democrat Al Smith, was prohibition. The Republicans termed it "The Noble Experiment."

Smith was dubbed "The Happy Warrior" by the late President Roosevelt. Republican slogans included "A Chicken in Every Pot" and "Hoover and Happiness or Al Smith and Soup-Houses."

F. D. R. Had Winner "A New Deal for the Forgotten Man" helped win the 1932 election for Franklin D. Roosevelt. Hoover, running for re-election, predicted "Prosperity is Just Around the Corner." Roosevelt's campaign song was "Happy Days Are Here Again," and the Republicans warned that if he won "The grass will grow in the streets of 100 cities."

In 1936 Roosevelt, running against Alfred M. Landon, coined the "Economic Royalist" phrase and called for a "Second New Deal."

Wendell Willkie, Republican candidate in 1940, was backed by the party slogan "win with Willkie, but Roosevelt won again."

"Win the War and the Peace with Roosevelt" caught on during the 1944 campaign, Lincoln's "Don't Swap Horses" was also used by Roosevelt supporters.

Thomas E. Dewey, Republican candidate, used "Time for a Change."

In the Congressional campaign of 1946 the Republicans used "Had Enough? Vote Republican November 5."

Shirley Temple A Mother! Where Did Years Fly?

NEW YORK.—(AP)—So Shirley Temple's a mother, I feel, as the poet said, "chilly and grown old."

Don't you?

No news could make an entire generation of men more aware of the passing of time than the announcement that the screen's one-time favorite moppet now has a daughter of her own.

Whv, wasn't it just yesterday that she took our hearts with her treble voice and chubby dancing legs in "Stand Up and Cheer?" You mean that was way back in 1934?

Where have the years gone? It isn't fair. It isn't fair at all. Shirley was the "Peter Pan" of our time, the symbol of childhood that never grows up, but is always fresh and fair and new.

No child in history ever took the world's heart more. Natural and unspoiled, she was the child that everyone yearned to have—pretty, warm-hearted, laughing and mischievous.

Each film—"Baby Takes a Bow," "Bright Eyes," "Little Miss Marker," "The Little Colonel," "Wee Willie Winkle," "Heidi," and all the others—only sealed her conquests.

Top Money Maker She was a junior ambassador on celluloid for America. It wasn't just the kids who were crazy about her, although they were, too. When Shirley's face clouded up on the screen in dimpled woe, theater managers had to put soft carpets on the floor to dim the sound of falling tears shed by old bachelors and spinners in the audience.

Hundreds of thousands of mothers across the land trotted their youngsters to dancing schools and vocal lessons, hoping by some legerdemain to change them into Shirley's. She became a kind of Madame Schiaparelli in the world of juvenile stars. For six years she was one of the ten top money makers among the movie stars, and she paid more in income taxes than Franklin Roosevelt got for running the country.

In her golden reign a man could get into a fist fight merely by stating he didn't like Shirley Temple. Wherever she traveled, she received the 24-karat welcome usually reserved for royalty and in her way she was about the nearest thing to a princess this democracy has ever had.

In those years Adolf Hitler rose and fell and a world went to war. Alphonse Capone has gone underground. Man o' War is dead, and Babe Ruth no longer points at the place in the bleachers where he is going to knock the next ball.

Where Did the Years Go? Change that touches all things touched Shirley, too. While we were busy with other things she just went ahead and grew up. The little girl in curls went into the cocoon of retirement and emerged a woman.

Something that was eternal—the spirit of childhood for which all adults are homesick—went with her baby curls.

It was bad enough to see Jack Coogan getting bald—and remember his timeless portrayal in "The Kid." But Shirley Temple a mother! That really gives us all a feeling of doddering antiquity.

Where did the years fly so fast? The next you know we'll be hearing Santa Claus has retired on an old age pension.

S. F. Cable Car Operators Gain Slight Wage Hike

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 3.—(AP)—AFL carmen yesterday accepted a compromise wage offer and returned to work on the privately owned Hyde and California Street cable cars after a 26-hour strike.

Union leaders agreed last night to recommend a return to work on the following wage provisions for 60 days:

1. A guaranteed hourly pay rate of \$1.27, or 93 per cent of \$1.38 rate before the strike.

2. Any amount above the guarantee that earnings permit the company to pay, even though the amount should rise above the pre-strike figure.
