You Can Hypnotize Wife, Appendix, But Don't Is Advice

NEW YORK—(AP)—Husbands with shrewish wives have sometimes toyed with the thought that life's treadmill would be more enjoyable if they could keep their spouses under hypnosis.

Take it from Marsh Babbitt, a professional hypnotist—that is a bad idea. "A man will do better if he appeals to his wife's love," he said.

On the other hand Babbitt—no relation to Sinclair Lewis, sees quite a future for hypnosis in curing people of bad habits, such as speech defects, stage fright, fingernail biting, overeating and excessive smoking.

"We also can alleviate pain and excessive nervousness in dental patients," he observed. "So that they even can have a tooth extracted without taking an ordinary anaesthetic."

Most intelligent people can learn to hypnotize themselves, Babbitt said, and added that it was little more difficult than piano playing. In its essentials—that is, proficiency is another matter.

Danger Pointed Out
"But the last thing I would want to do is teach the average person to neutralize nature's danger signal—pain. He might cure a pain in his side that way some night and die the next day of a ruptured appendix."

Babbitt once flew down to North Carolina and hypnotized a 24-year-old Negro out of the belief that he was dying of a "hex" laid on him by a witch doctor.

"Since then many people have come to me to be cured of hexes," he smiled. "You'd be amazed by the number who believe in the evil eye."

Results Via Television
Babbitt, 45, is a former salesman who took up hypnotism as a hobby in his youth. He recently has appeared on television shows. This week he staged a demonstration to show that he could hypnotize people who had never seen him with a phonographic recording of his voice. It worked six out of eight times, he said.

Babbitt believes hypnotism is induced by creating hyper sugges-

ibility in and confidence in the hypnotist.

"You don't need to glare at them, wave your hands or indulge in any stage business," he says.

Resistance to Evil
The Svengali tradition dies hard, however, and the question most people still ask him is: "Can you make a person under hypnosis commit a crime or kill himself?"

His answer: "If there is subconscious resistance there will be no hypnosis. People under hypnosis will not respond to suggestions which they think are not good."

"If an improper suggestion is made to them they either force themselves out of hypnosis or merely stay in hypnosis and refuse to obey the suggestion."

Babbitt said there were few records of crimes involving hypnosis.

"And I've never heard of one that was successful."

What would happen to a person under hypnosis if the hypnotist suddenly died?

"He would pass from hypnosis into sleep and wake up when he was rested."

Can everybody be hypnotized? "I'd say at least 98 per cent. But one German doctor tried 700 times before he succeeded, finally on one difficult patient."

Babbitt said he recalled whether the patient was a man or a woman.

Mrs. Roosevelt To Address U. N. Over Russ Objections

LAKE SUCCESS, Feb. 5.—(AP)—Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt was called to speak before the United Nations Economic and Social Council today.

She appears as chairman of the U. N. Commission on Human Rights to present a report on her group's recent Geneva meeting.

The 18-nation council decided to hear her after overruling objections from White Russia. Delegate Leonid Karminsky contended the council had no time to study the commission's work and it would be premature to listen to Mrs. Roosevelt now.

The council turned to the human rights discussion after hearing Britain and Russia exchange political accusations. Britain charged Russian activity in Eastern Europe made the Soviet Union an "expanding imperialist power." Russia called the accusation a "monstrous falsehood" and said Britain was using the council for "hostile propaganda

against the Soviet Union."

Russia was reported today to have informed the United Nations that Soviet economic production is back to prewar levels.

The Soviet data arrived too late for inclusion in the U. N.'s first big survey on world economic con-

ditions issued last night.

While the Soviet report contained no information not already published, U. N. officials said this was the first time Russia had supplied the U. N. with production data of any kind.
