PULLMAN, Wash., Feb. 5.—(P)—Washington State was crowding the Oregon State Beavers closely today for first place in the Northern Division Pacific Coast Conference basketball race after taking a second close decision 60 to 59 over Oregon. The Cougars won Tuesday night on an overtime score of 66-65.

Only a few percentage points separated Washington State from Beavers. Oregon State has won five and lost two while Washington State has won 6 and lost 3. Ed Gayda stole the ball from Oregon State and laid it in a second ahead of the gun to give Washington State last night's electrifying win.

Oregon had started out strong, running the score to 16-5 before Washington State sparked. The winners salvaged a 34-31 tie at the intermission, and then both teams fought the rest of the half on even terms, knotting the count six times.

With 30 seconds to go, Oregon held a lead of 59-56. Vince Hanson tossed a hook shot to boost the lower half of the count to 58. Gayda followed with an underhand lay-in.

Hanson was the night's top scorer with 19. Roger Wiley of Oregon had 14 to lead his team.

Sioux City Ghosts Victors Over JVR's

After holding a lead in every quarter but the last and posting a halftime margin of 23-16, the JVR's basketball team went down to defeat before the Sioux City Ghosts here last night, 52-43.

The game was the best-coordinated and smoothest the JVR's have played this season. Douglas James sank the first counter immediately after the first tip-off. Lowell Atterbury was high scorer for the JVR's with 10 points. He sank four out of four free throws. High point man of the game was Ghost Stan Barnell with 17. The JVR's committed only five fouls. The Ghosts didn't indulge in as much clowning as the Harlem Globetrotters, previously here, but their sleight-of-hand passing and other tricks—such as assuming a "persecution complex" when a foul was called against one of them—were just as entertaining. Their roadster ability surpasses that of the Trotters.

It seemed that at some stages of the game the Ghosts displayed a little too much artistry and not enough scoring ability, since they were visibly hard at work during the fourth period wrestling the lead from the Roseburg team. They managed, however, to score 21 points in the third.

After the game, when Captain Jimmy Dilworth was asked whether he had any doubts about winning, he said "No, the boys just weren't hitting during the first half." Most of the Ghost players are rookies, picked for their speed rather than experience. The average age is 20.4 years. Last night's lineup:

Woman Wins First Title For U. S. In Winter Olympics

ST. MORITZ, Switzerland, Feb. 5.—(AP)—The swishing skin of Mrs. Britchen Fraser brought America its first championship in the fifth winter Olympics today when the 25-year-old Vancouver, Wash. housewife sped to victory in the women's special slalom.

Outclassing Europe's masters in their own specialty, the tiny West coast star made two brilliant, zig-zagging descents over the precipitous alpine course in one minute, 57.2 seconds.

The victory—following on the heels of her second place medal in yesterday's alpine combined event, consisting of both downhill and slalom skiing—was one of the

biggest upsets of the current games.

The men's counterpart of the slalom went to Edi Reinhalter of Switzerland as the Swiss forged in front of Sweden in the race for team honors. Reinhalter had two dashes down the mountain-side in a total of two minutes, 10.3 seconds.

Another American—daring sledder Jack Heaton of New Haven, Conn.—finished second in the suicidal Cresta (skeleton sled) runs as the United States staged a mid-point rally in the winter carnival that to date has been dominated by Scandinavians.

The good showing vaulted the Americans back into sixth place in the team standings.

Also, they stood to better their record later in the day when young Dick Button of Englewood, N. J., takes to the ice in the figure skating finals. Already ahead after the difficult compulsory figures, the 18-year-old skating artist was figured a cinch to breeze in on his free-style skill.

Boxing, Wrestling At R. H. S. Starts

After a long delay, Coach "Cec" Sherwood's boxing and wrestling workouts got underway last week at R.H.S. The delay was caused by a remodeling job being done to the dressing room underneath the football field grandstand. The boxing quarters are now completely enclosed and a new furnace has been installed.

So far 30 boys have turned out for daily practice after school—18 for boxing and 12 for wrestling. Most work so far has been in fundamental conditioning. Joe Toman, athletic director at the Roseburg Veterans hospital, is assisting Sherwood with the program, helping on his own time. Wrestling is being offered as a regular sport at the high school for the first time this year. Wrestling and boxing bouts

have been scheduled with Springfield, at Springfield Feb. 11, and at Roseburg Feb. 19. Sherwood has written to other schools and expects to line up more bouts.
