**Mrs. J. Shoemaker,
Roseburg Resident
36 Years, Passes**

Madame Jerima Shoemaker, 88, resident of Roseburg for 36 years, died suddenly last night, Feb. 5, at her home on Blakey Street. She was born Oct. 12, 1859, in Heidelberg, Germany, the daughter of Karl Wilhelm Kuhn and Marie von Bertram Kuhn. She was educated in Heidelberg and Berlin and in 1881 married Milton J. Shoemaker, who was studying at Heidelberg University. They came to the United States and established themselves in Mr. Shoemaker's home town, Napoleon, Ohio. She early took up her naturalization papers in the United States.

In 1912 she and her family came to Oregon to make their home. She was preceded in death by her husband in 1923. She was a member of the First Presbyterian Church of Roseburg.

Surviving are three sons: Carl D., Washington, D. C.; Sam J., and Dr. Bertram R., both of Roseburg; a daughter, Mrs. Hildegard Briggs, Roseburg; 10 grandchildren: Milton J., Texas; Mrs. Lee R. Dawson, Honolulu; Mrs. Walter Allen, Bertram Jr., Sam Jr. and Robert Shoemaker, all of Roseburg; Mrs. Robert Norton, Corvallis; James W., and Jerry Briggs and Mrs. C. T. Toohy, all of Alameda, Calif., and 10 great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be announced by the Roseburg Funeral Home pending arrival of relatives.

**Titular Go Tops
Saturday Night's
Wrestling Card**

Douglas County wrestling followers are expected to turn out in droves Saturday night to witness the return of Frankie Hart, popular Canadian, to the Roseburg Armory. The talented grappler returned to the Northwest recently after closing his hunting and fishing lodge at Washagami, Ontario, where he kept in condition by guiding parties through the rugged country.

En route to the northwest, Hart made a quick swing through the midwest and knocked over some of the best grapplers in the business while working the kinks out of his muscles. He has been making an impressive record in Portland, Eugene, and in Washington during the past few weeks and is ready to take on the best in the business. He will meet Billy Hickson, the young Californian who until recently held the coast light-heavy title and was good enough to beat the "Gray Mask" to cop the crown.

Hart received lucrative offers to appear in Hollywood, but said he likes the Oregon people and wants to remain here until he opens his Canadian lodge in the spring. His kick-ups to evade opponents and his spinning toe holds and drop kicks will be everything Hickson wants.

Sammy "The Devil" Cohen, the

so-called "cover boy" of wrestling, also has a big bill to fill in meeting George Curtis in the opener. Curtis, a young ex-collegiate gridman from Mississippi, lacks only the speed needed to become a title contender. He is powerful and aggressive and capable of handling out as much punishment as the Brooklyn Jewish boy.

Big attraction, despite the lure of the preliminaries, will be the Pacific coast light-heavy championship bout between Champion Joe Dorsett of New York and Challenger Tex Hager of Oregon. Hager managed to defeat Dorsett here several weeks ago, but must shave off a few pounds to make the 160-pound limit by Saturday afternoon. It was reported that he is within three pounds of the limit at the present time.

Hager is certain to be the popular favorite against the hard-punching New York Italian.

It looks like a busy evening for Elton Owen, who will referee all three bouts. The opener gets underway at 8:30 p. m., and a capacity crowd is expected.

**Barbara Ann Scott
Wins Skating Title
At Olympic Games**

ST. MORITZ, Switzerland, Feb. 5.—(AP)—Rhythmic Barbara Ann Scott, Canada's darling of the ice, won the women's figure skating championship in the fifth winter Olympics today—giving the western hemisphere a sweep of skating titles that have been the exclusive property of Europe.

The pretty, 19-year-old Canadian star gave an almost flawless performance in her final free skating maneuvers to take the crown won by Norway's Sonja Henie in the last three Olympic carnivals.

Her victory follows by only 24 hours that of Richard Button of Englewood, N. J., in the men's competition.

The games—with only two more days to go—produced these other developments:

1. Sweden's stout-hearted distance men pushed that country ahead of Switzerland in the sea-saw race for the lead in team standings, with the United States holding a strong third.

2. Nils Karlsson of Sweden won the 50-kilometer (31-mile) ski race in three hours, 47 minutes and 48 seconds.

3. America's daring bobsledders kept the United States' late rally alive with a top showing in early heats of the dangerous four-man bobsled race.

HOTFOOT COSTS \$2,500
