Production Of Plutonium Task At Hanford Plant

SEATTLE—(AP)—The scientific dream of the middle ages—changing of one element into another—is the basic principle of the Hanford Atomic Energy Project, a project engineers told a gathering of electrical engineers here last night.

C. F. Cabell, a member of the Hanford Works Technical Department, said the plant was the first practical application of the principle of transmutation sought by scientists for 700 years.

Although nuclear reactors such as used at Hanford are capable of making mercury from gold or gold from platinum, Cabell said the program is directed exclusively at the production of plutonium—a new metal of almost incredible value.

Plutonium, he said, "releases almost unimaginable energy under proper conditions and, like uranium 235, it can be used as a shattering atomic bomb."

He described the plutonium as the "hope of modern engineers" as a nuclear fuel in the production of electrical power, but predicted that realization of that hope still is decades away.

Cabell said the new metal is converted from uranium and described the objective of the Hanford Project as the continued

production of plutonium "To make the operation both more efficient and less expensive."
