An important meeting of the Gray Ladies has been announced for Tuesday evening, February 17, at 8 o'clock to be held at the armory. All members are urged to be present.

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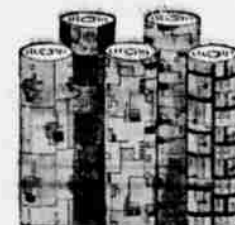
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
