American farmer and may prove disastrous. The law was passed by congress in December—around seven weeks ago.

IN Garden City, Kansas, where the wheat fields ran on and on to the horizon and just about everything revolves around wheat, a reporter went out to talk to farmers the other day and got an earful.

One grower of wheat told him: "I can't see any reason for the break. It was dirty politics."

"The innate fair thinking that grows up out of closeness to the soil intervened at this point, and the indignant wheat producer added judiciously: "If other prices come down accordingly, though, everything might work out."

"That puts it briefly, neatly and accurately. WHAT did cause the big grain break?

"This writer doesn't even pretend to know, but suspects there may be more grain in sight and upcoming throughout the world than has been generally realized. To this extent, the farmer has been fortunate.

The break comes in midwinter, BEFORE spring plantings are under way. If it had come at harvest time, AFTER a high-wind-and-hand-dome, sky-the-limit, yell-with-cost growing season, it would have been far worse.

When you've got all your resources tied up in something you can't sell for anything like what it cost you, it's tough. If that never happened to you, you've been lucky.

DOWN in Los Angeles, the psychiatrists are having a field day. One of them says gloomily America is on the brink of disintegration.

Another, more or less agreeing, thinks that at the cost of "a mere two battalions" we could set up a research program capable of curing 50,000 mental patients per year, thus holding the balance more nearly even.

SUPPOSE we got in a bad pinch in this bandit-minded world and needed the two battalions to pull us out of the hole? Might not that particular strain run a lot more of us crazy?

Unused Minerals on O. & C. Lands Listed

PORTLAND, Feb. 16.—(AP)—A list of still unused minerals on Oregon & California Railroad grant lands in Western Oregon was described last week to the Oregon Chamber of Commerce secretaries' meeting.

The list was prepared in conjunction with a bill which Senator Gordon and Representative Milsworth are fostering to have O. & C. lands opened for use of mineral resources.

Mineral deposits were described as: High alumina clay at Bobart Butte, near Cottage Grove.

High-iron bauxite west of Portland.

Barite in Douglas County's Silver Peak mining district.

Bentonite northeast of Ashland.

Chromite east of Wolf Creek.

Marble limestone in the Jones Quarry south of Grants Pass.

Nickel near Riddle.

SUSTAINED YIELD CRISIS

The question of whether a sustained yield forest management policy shall be put into effect has reached the crucial stage.

The Bureau of Land Management, previously known as the O. & C. Administration, has completed the outline of its plan, has designated master market units, has mapped out working circles, and has, at long last, reached the stage where it is prepared to enter into contracts with individual operators.

This is the critical point in the program and, as was to be expected, strong opposition has developed. An association of small mill owners has filed suit in federal district court seeking to enjoin the Interior Department from proceeding under the new act.

It is very much as if a large number of candy bars were to be placed in a gold fish bowl. Only a few hands can reach into the bowl, so those who can't crowd in will get no candy.

These timber lands in question are owned by the public and should be administered to the public's best interest. The public is interested (1) in highest possible returns for its timber asset, (2) in the number of jobs created in the manufacture of the resource, (3) in the permanence of jobs so created, (4) in assurance that the asset will be conserved and protected.

Opposition to the sustained yield program charges that the program will reduce jobs and leave ghost towns. Such accusation certainly deserves study for that, it seems to us, is the one thing we want most to avoid.

As to the first issue of public interest, it must be apparent to anyone that we are not getting full value for our timber asset. Too much of our timber is being bought by operators who produce nothing but rough green lumber and who waste as much as or more than they cut.

Our primary interest from a public standpoint is in jobs. Sustained yield opponents claim that because some small mills will be forced out of business we will have fewer jobs.

A cooperator under the sustained yield contract will be assigned a certain unit of timber. He will be permitted to cut a specified amount of that timber each year.

Practical Aid To Europe Advocated By Salfonstall

SEATTLE, Feb. 16.—(AP)—A program of "practical aid" to European countries was advocated last week by Senator Leverett Salfonstall, Massachusetts Republican and speaker at Seattle's Lincoln Day observance.

"As one Republican," he declared, "I want to see our party take an affirmative position. I want to give practical aid to our friends across the seas now struggling to get back to their feet."

Salfonstall said five weeks of travel in England and on the Continent last fall convinced him that "the risk of going ahead and doing something about European recovery is a far better risk than to do nothing."

He said also that the United States should give effective aid to China and develop strong military forces for contingencies.

"Our security and preparedness may well require the adoption of a plan for military training," he declared. "To be trained and skillful in modern warfare may, in the last analysis, save the lives of many a young man."

Of the domestic economy, the Massachusetts senator said that Republicans seek to combat inflation by encouraging production, eliminating non-essential government expenses and reducing debts and taxation, and restricting exports to nations not devastated by war.

He criticized what he described as President Truman's "approach to the inflation problem... renewed governmental controls over our lives."
