England to Send Back Wright Brothers' Plane

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—(AP)—The Wright Brothers' plane which made the world's first powered flight with a man aboard is coming home after a 20-year exile.

The Kensington Museum of Science announced at London last week it is ready to send the frail biplane "Kittyhawk" back to the United States.

The Smithsonian Institute, a government museum in Washington, has promised it the place of

"highest honor, which is its due." It was a feat with the Smithsonian over credit for the world's first heavier-than-air flight which led Orville Wright to ship the little aircraft abroad in 1928.
