Ah-h-h, There's Good News Today

A friend of ours, after suffering acutely for several weeks, finally went to the hospital for an operation. Coming out of the ether, and feeling no pain, she decided she must have lived right, since this must be heaven. And so it must seem to the long suffering poultry people who buy feed at the Douglas County Flour Mill. This week they have been getting wheat and scratch for a full half-a-buck less money. Mash is down some too, though not so much.

We are again yielding to temptation, and here goes with a little more of our free advice. For a short time at least, we advise that you buy from hand-to-mouth only, as we think prices will go lower in the next few days. We have been buying that way for months past, so this drastic break in prices catches us with very little high priced merchandise. And you, the customer are going to get the benefit in lower prices quicker.

Yes-sir, we cut the prices on wheat, corn and scratch by \$10.00 a ton. And we're going to lower the boom on some more prices just as soon as things get a bit. Maybe even before you read this.

Of course, if you have grain or soybeans to sell, all this is a nightmare to you. But if you are buying it is a pleasant story. Besides, if you are selling, remember, we hinted to you three or four weeks ago that it was a good time to sell.

We don't know how low prices go. Don't even know how low they can go, for there is a floor price under a lot of farm commodities. We hear and read all sorts of things. The way things have been going, and the way certain people hoped they would continue going, there was no plan made to put these support prices into effect.

But as nearly as we can figure on available facts right at this minute, the Government will support wheat at about \$67.00 a ton, corn at \$52.00 and oats at \$56.00. Which doesn't guarantee that we or you can buy at these figures. Only time will tell. Of course, we sincerely hope, and we believe this is not the long dreaded "depression". We KNOW prices have been out of line, and we think this is merely a leveling off and adjustment.

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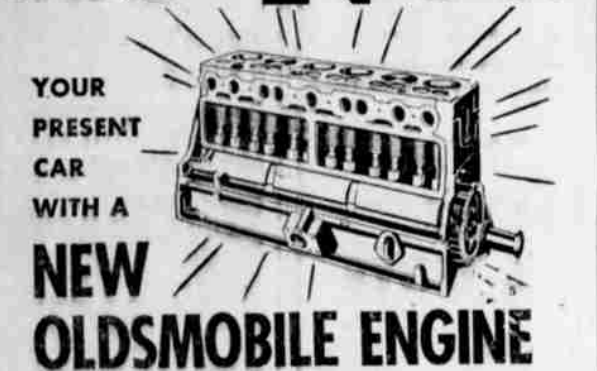
