The Roseburg High Indians recaptured second place in league standings Saturday when they marked up their second win in two days over Coquille, 41-29.

Dusette Defeats Stojack Two Out Of Three Falls

Frank Stojack emerged from the wrestling headlines at the Roseburg Armory Saturday night still in possession of his title as Pacific Coast light heavyweight champion solely because the title was not at stake. Had it been a titular bout, the emblematic belt would now be the property of George Dusette, who decisively defeated Stojack two out of three falls in an over-all period of little more than 25 minutes. A crowd of 600 gave the victor a big hand.

Dusette won the first and third falls of the battle with his unbreakable full nelson hold. The third and decisive round was an action-packed affair of only 25 seconds. The opening stanza ended in 14:10, the second one in 8:28 after Stojack caught the muscular Canadian in his spectacular airplane spin and whirled him around 25 times by actual count. A minute previously, Stojack hurled Dusette over the ropes and onto the floor in a football-style rush for a leg hold. The Canadian came back to the mat limping and was comparatively easy game for the hold that hoisted him for the win.

It was the second battle of the pair within a week. At Salem last Tuesday, they fought to a draw—one fall apiece within the one-hour limit.

Katonen Beats Curtis. Paavo Katonen, the ferocious Finn, and his complete assortment of villainy from head-butting to rope crawling, proved too much for George Curtis in the semi-final. Halfway in the 30-minute bout, Katonen caught Curtis in his deadly hangman hold for the only fall, after the gampling Mississippian twice refused to accept a verdict on fouls. From start to finish, Referee Elton Owen was kept constantly in action, interrupting Katonen's foul tactics, either by working or slugging him. The crowd cheered Curtis with a batch of cheers and gave the Finn a barrage of boos.

In the opener, referee "Bulldog" Jackson, who began his mat career when a lot of adults in the audience were in their teens, offered hardly more than a casual workout for Sammy Cohen, the flashy Hebrew muscle marvel. He succumbed to a surfboard hold in 9:25.

Roseburg Gun Club Team Scores 72 In State Shoot
