Woodworkers, Employers Schedule Wage Parley

PORTLAND, Feb. 17.—(AP)—CIO woodworkers and Northwest fir operators are to open wage negotiations here Wednesday on the union's demand for a 40-cent hourly wage boost after a preliminary session yesterday.

James E. Fadling, International president, said operators of the Willamette Valley and Coast-Columbia districts would be represented along with the Lumbermen's Industrial Relations committee. Pine employers declined to join in the session, he said.

The 40-cent an hour request includes a 7 1/2 cent health and welfare fund.

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Slowing of Pulse Beat Learned By U. of O. Savants

PORTLAND, Feb. 17.—(AP)—University of Oregon Medical School physiologists have learned how to slow a halter on runaway pulses and slow the heart's timing mechanism.

Experiments directed by Dr. W. B. Youmans, head of physiology at the school here, brought successful results on animals and then on a number of human patients.

He explained that the heart ailment, technically known as Paroxysmal Tachycardia, is quite common, but more frightening than immediately harmful. He said the pulse jumps its pace from 72 beats a minute to between 160 and 220 a minute. If allowed to run unchecked, the heart muscles and valves will give out.

Normal pulse beat has been restored to patients by intravenous injections of the drug neoprene. Dr. Youmans reported the drug gently constricts the arteries and increases blood pressure. The blood pressure corrects the timing apparatus of the heart and the pulse beat becomes normal. Relief is almost instantaneous.

Associated with Dr. Youmans in the research were Dr. M. J. Goodman and Dr. Jarvis Gould. Their findings will be reported to the American Heart Association at a June meeting in Chicago.
