BULLETIN SENT TO OREGON CLUB WOMEN ON NATIONAL CONVENTION

A comprehensive bulletin has just been released to all club presidents and board members of the Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs, giving detailed information about the Oregon committee for the annual convention of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, to be held in Portland in May.

Mrs. O. D. Trexler, Portland, representing the Portland Federation of Women's Clubs, has the largest number of committees under her supervision. These include the committees for the Oregon State banquet on Monday, May 24, the Sea Food Buffet supper, Friday, May 28, and the five regional dinners, the speakers and guests committee under Mrs. Fred Noll, the ticket committee headed by Mrs. Emory Trahan, and the committee on tours under the direction of Mrs. E. E. Hall.

The bulletin board committee in charge of the Portland Overlook Woman's Club with Mrs. Arthur Brooks as chairman, will keep in touch with the information desk, and the general federation headquarters office about the announcements to be placed on the bulletin board.

The six districts of the Oregon federation make up the Credentials committee, with Mrs. William King, Pendleton, state recording secretary, as chairman. This committee will assist the general federation Credentials committee with registration. The Portland Nauticus Club will work with the Platform chairman of the general federation in decorating the platform. The auditorium doors will be manned by the Scholls Woman's Club with Mrs. L. W. Guild, president, as chairman.

The hospitality committee consists of the Oregon federation board, with Mrs. A. A. MacIntyre of Pendleton as chairman.

Three junior clubs, the Forest Grove Juniors, with Mrs. Tom Dickinson, president, serving as chairman, the Scholls Juniors and the Pacific Progress Juniors, will man the "Wishing Wells" which will be placed at the auditorium, hotels, and the Masonic Temple. The Portland Sorosis club is

in charge of the Foreign and Territorial committee.

Junior activities are under the direction of Mrs. Emory Ingham, Portland, junior extension chairman, who will assist the general federation junior chairman with plans for junior activities. Music is under the direction of Mrs. W. F. Gaskins, Corvallis, the press room will be handled by Mrs. J. B. Twiford, Hillsboro.

The platform committee, consisting of the Portland Women's Research club, with Mrs. Carl L. Rasmussen as chairman, will work with the general federation secretary, planning the platform shifts for each session. Radio is in the hands of Mrs. J. L. Gault, Corvallis, state radio chairman. The reception for Mrs. J. L. Blair Buck, president of the general federation at the Portland Art Museum on Monday, May 24, will be in charge of the Portland Woman's club, under the direction of Mrs. William Bunney, Tigard. The committee on ushering and seating is headed by the Hillsboro Coffee club, Mrs. John Hare, as chairman.

Four-Time Jail Breaker Lands Behind Bars Again

PORTLAND, Feb. 18.—(AP)—Wesley E. Davis, whose toothache aided in one of four jail breaks he made in 1946, is in again.

The 20-year-old Portlander was arrested by Detectives Vern McCabe and Gordon Putnam on charges of grand larceny and escape.

Police department records outline his busy 1946 this way:

In January he escaped from the county jail at Mount Vernon, Wash., but was recaptured and later paroled. In November, in jail at Baker, on a car theft charge, he complained of a toothache and, while returning from the dentist's, broke away from

the sheriff. He was recaptured and paroled to his father in Portland. Shortly thereafter he was arrested at Weiser, Idaho, on a Portland motorcycle theft charge but fled at the jail door. Jailed again at Vale, he tried to escape but failed. In December, he sawed his way out of the Portland city jail.

McCabe said Davis reported he subsequently had been in the Kansas state reformatory.

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
