"Moonshining" to Pay Debt Draws Jail Term

TULSA, Okla. — (AP) — Federal Judge Royce H. Savage agrees that determination to pay one's debts is worthy, but that law breaking just isn't the way to go about it.

A sharecropper haled into his court told the judge he started "moonshining" to pay off a \$100 bank loan. The culprit said he "had it down to \$4.75" before the revenue agents moved in.

The judge assessed him 60 days in jail, plus a year's probation.

Farm Loan Assn. To Hand Out Dividends At Annual Meet

Dividend checks will be distributed to stockholders of the Douglas County National Farm Loan Association at the annual meeting of the cooperative credit organization in Roseburg on Thursday, Feb. 26, according to R. L. Strickie, secretary-treasurer.

This disbursement is part of a \$176,000 dividend recently declared by the Federal Land Bank of Spokane. The Douglas County National Farm Loan Association and 75 similar local associations in Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Washington entirely own the bank's capital stock, Strickie said.

The association's stock in turn, is owned by the farmers and ranchers who have obtained bank loans. Being a cooperative, the association passes the bank's dividend on to its members, retaining only a small portion needed to assure a long-time sound business operation, Strickie added.

He said arrangements have been completed for a dinner to precede the business meeting. The meal will be served at 12 noon in the Odd Fellows hall.

Arnold Anderson of the Land Bank will attend to discuss briefly the part played by NFPA members in building a strong cooperative credit system. Eugene Fisher, association president, will preside.

Youth, 12, Has Record of Six Hospital Sessions

TULSA, Okla. — (AP) — Louis McDonald of Tulsa, 12, thinks he has been in hospitals enough.

Louis is home again after his sixth hospital session. He suffered his first serious accident—a broken arm—when only two. Shortly afterward he broke a leg. When he was eleven a fall from a horse resulted in another broken arm.

Not long after the arm healed, Louis fell while running with a stick in his mouth, ripping a tonsil from his throat.

His next accident brought severe burns. While lying too close to a fire in his home, a comic book in hand, his clothing suddenly became aflame—and back to the hospital he went.

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Oregon Need to Exceed Egg Output, Forecast

PORTLAND — (AP) — Oregon egg production will not meet demand this year, despite increasing output.

This was the prediction of Grover C. Kenney, general manager of the Pacific Cooperative Poultry Producers, at their annual meeting here.

He said production last year reached its lowest level since 1926. It will be better this year, but still will fall short by 15 per cent in providing as many eggs as the state needs.

The group charged there was upgrading of eggs in Portland and other markets last year. A resolution asked stricter enforcement of grading laws and more money for State Department of Agriculture inspection work.

L. G. Clark, Eugene, was elected president; Lawrence Lay, Medford, vice-president, and A. C. Berntsen, Eugene, secretary-treasurer.

3 Teams Bunched For North Zone's Basketball Lead

SEATTLE, Feb. 23. — (AP) — A three-way tie for the Northern Division Coast Conference basketball title loomed today as one of several major possibilities at Washington State, Oregon State and Washington fought toward the finish wire. Each of the leaders is separated by a half game.

Both Washington State and Washington have four remaining games. Washington's are all against fifth place Idaho. Washington State faces a tough Oregon road jaunt this weekend, two games each against Oregon State and Oregon.

Oregon State also has a single game remaining with Oregon. The Huskies go into the Idaho series off a tough weekend series at Pullman. After a Friday night win over the Cougars that pulled them into a first place deadlock, Washington turned in third off a grueling 62-58 double overtime loss.

The regular tilt ended 47-all after Washington's Jack Nichols left the game on fouls. Going into the overtime, Washington took a 54-49 lead only at 54:54. Washington State put it away in the second overtime with Vince Hanson counting four of the Cougars' eight points to run his night total to 23. Sammy White topped the losers with 15.

Oregon State got back into

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the chase Saturday with a 56-45 win over neighboring Oregon, its first in three attempts. Thirty of the winners' points came on foul shots. Dick Baily, the night's top scorer, picked up two field goals and 10 foul shot points for a 14-point total. Berg and Wilkins each hit eight for Oregon.

16 Buses Used on Most Traveled School Route

LANCASTER, Calif. — (AP) — Antelope Valley Union High School students claim a place among the most "traveled" pupils in the nation.

Sixteen buses cover 1,200 miles daily gathering students from the school district's 3,476 square miles. The buses use 200 gallons of gas each day.

Round trips range from 42 to 116 miles. Average round trip is 76 miles.

Of the school's 1,052 students, about 840 ride the buses. The school district includes the northern half of Los Angeles county and a portion of Kern county.

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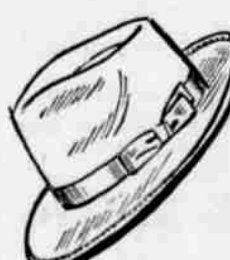
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
