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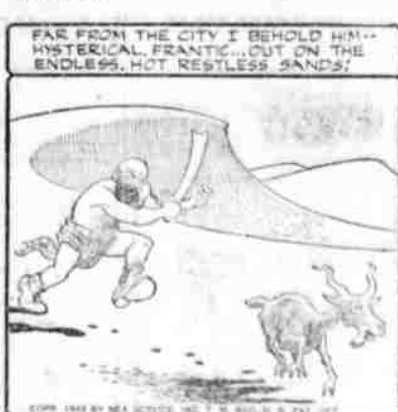

Range Paralysis.

One of the most costly diseases the poultrymen of the United States have to fight is range paralysis, or the "paralysis complex" perhaps more scientifically known as the "leucosis complex." But whether you call it by its first name or its scientific name, it is a costly and discouraging proposition.

Just when the pullets seem to be coming so fine—BAM!—they go down in the legs, go blind, go light, or something else happens. Unless you have some idea of this disease, you no doubt wonder when some so-called expert tells you all these different things are the symptoms of the same disease. But that's right.

The disease seems to affect first the blood, and later to centralize in some nerve. And whichever nerve happens to be selected by the disease organisms to observe. For instance, if it is the optic nerve, the bird will go blind. If it's the sciatic nerve, the bird becomes paralyzed in the leg, or legs.

So far, Science has no cure to offer. Our only hope lies in prevention. Here at the Douglas County Flour Mill, we can't offer you any medicated feed, nor anything to put in the drinking water that will help in the least, once the birds show signs of paralysis.

But, Science has learned one thing for us, that is proving highly important. Most chickens pick up the disease during the first four weeks of their lives. Of course, you almost NEVER see paralyzed birds under two months, and on up to a year old. For some reason, the disease often works so slowly that symptoms occur only after several months.

The best preventive is accomplished by completely quarantining chicks from older birds. It will pay you well to divide the work during brooding; one person to care for the chick, and keep away from older birds; and the other to handle the old stock, and avoid the chick if they had the plague. That and sanitation is your only hope.

Formula For Getting Rich.

Not that we want to get rich, but if we did, we would get it the money we could, then keep it as long as possible. Then, in order to keep on good terms with our neighbors, we would try to get said money as far from home as possible.

Take Oregon, for instance. We sell lots of our home grown timber back East, and that money comes out to Oregon, and we should be able to keep a lot of it. But suppose for instance, we don't produce enough chickens and eggs for our own use, so we have to go back East and buy. That takes our timber money and leaves us right where we were in the beginning.

Only a few years ago, we used to ship eggs back East, but "them days are gone forever." It's either going to cost us a lot of money to buy, or else we will have to produce the deficit ourselves. It may come as a surprise to many the amount of poultry products that come to the Pacific Coast from the Middle West.

Here are some interesting figures from San Francisco, and in a measure they could be duplicated from any large city on the Coast. Oregon shipped to Frisco in 1947, 20,000 cases of eggs. But Iowa sent 100,000 cases, Nebraska 120,000 and Minnesota 73,000 cases.

Oregon shipped over a million pounds of dressed poultry, but Kansas shipped a fifth more, and Nebraska shipped three times as much. And even BUTTER. Oregon shipped over two million pounds, but was crowded closely by Wisconsin, Idaho and Nebraska, and a number of other midwestern states ran a million pounds.

Let's suppose Oregon had produced and sold in S. F. those 120,000 cases of eggs that Nebraska sold. The added income to Oregon would have been at least \$2,000,000, and, Brother, that ain't hay.

So that formula for getting rich might include buying the

feed from the Flour Mill at economy prices for highest quality and producing produce for this wonderful and increasing Pacific Coast Market, and keeping all that money in Douglas County and Oregon, where it will do the most good and buy the most comfort and luxury for our own people. It's worth considering, eh?
