

Dorsetti Regains Light-Heavy Title By Beating Hager

The Pacific Coast light-heavyweight wrestling title shuttled back into Joe Dorsetti's possession at the Roseburg Armory Saturday night, when the Brooklyn "meanie" defeated his former conqueror, Tex Hager, two out of three falls in a bout that occupied less than one-half of the scheduled limit of one hour. A crowd of 600 fans boomed their displeasure at the result. Jack Mitchell, a Portland importation, was the referee. He gave both of his arms plenty of exercise during the battle yanking Dorsetti out of foul maneuvers and gesturing to embellish frequent and utterly useless warnings to him.

The first fall was captured by Dorsetti in 14:38 with a brace of drop kicks, followed by a body press. Drop kicks were also used by Hager to register a fall in the second round. He used three of them in succession and then piled a head scissors to even the score in 7:48. An attempt to use a flying head scissors in the final round, after jamming his foe against the ropes, caused Hager to lose the match. He missed his target, fell outside the ropes, and a vigorous kick in the region of the kidneys sent him sprawling on the floor. Barely within the 20-second time limit, Hager managed to crawl back onto the mat in a weakened condition only to meet a quick finish. A volley of kidney punches saw the remaining power of effective resistance and Dorsetti's hangman hold, twice annulled, ended the struggle. This session lasted only 5 minutes 2 seconds.

Other Results

Buck Weaver and Frankie Hart gave the crowd a classy exhibition of science and speed in the semi-final which ended in a one-fall-avice draw. Hart took the first fall in 14:04 with a head butt and drop toe hold. Weaver retaliated by annexing the next fall in 12:15 with his major wear-on-the-combination backward flip and necktwister. Thrice during the remaining period of the half-hour battle, Buck missed attempts to repeat the finisher, and Hart held his own to even honors between the granniers.

George Curtis, the gangling Mississippian, finally got into the win column on the local mat by defeating Tony Ross, the Salem sadist, in the one-fall-onener. Battling Tony on the latter's own terms, Curtis felled him with a brace of drop kicks and a press in 8:15.

Indians Defeat Bobcats, 43-42, In Overtime Battle

The Roseburg High Indians came back from their 36-35 loss to the Myrtle Creek basketball quintet Friday to trim the Bobcats Saturday night at the Senior High, 43-42, in a three-minute overtime period resulting from a 36-36 fourth-quarter tie.

Roseburg held the Myrtle Point squad to two field goals during the first quarter while marking up five along with four conversions out of four attempts to a first-period lead of 14-4.

The Indians led the game through a 20-15 half-time score and a 30-21 advantage at the close of the third, until Hatfield sank a field goal for the Bobcats to bring the score to 36-36 at the end of the fourth quarter.

Early in the overtime period, Ford put Myrtle Creek in the lead by two points and Schilder evened it at 38-38; then a field goal by Nichols of Myrtle Point was matched with one by Blank.

With the game tied up at 40-40, Shindler was allotted two free throws by virtue of the only foul committed in the overtime. The first one he missed, the second went through the strings to give Roseburg a one-point lead.

The picture was reversed a few seconds later when Jarvis sank a field goal from side-court and Hubbard connected with the last counter of the game with 18 seconds to go.

Myrtle Point called time-out with four seconds to go and came back with an attempt by Farrier which missed the bucket as the closing whistle sounded.
