Farm Loan Assn. Benefits Cited At Annual Meeting

Because the Douglas County National Farm Loan Association is a cooperative owned by the farmers who use its services, earnings and other benefits accruing to the association are shared with its farmer-owners, Arnold Anderson, regional manager of the Federal Land Bank of Spokane, told members of the association at their annual meeting in Roseburg yesterday. Land bank loans are made and serviced through this and 75 similar associations in Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Washington.

After discussing the strong financial position of the bank at Spokane and the nationwide cooperative land bank system, Anderson revealed that more than 50 per cent of the bank's loan business during the past year was directly traceable to the work of associate members.

"This," he said, "indicates the interest members are taking in their credit organization, appreciating the fact that they are the recipients of advantages resulting from an increased membership and a larger loan volume."

The bank official referred to the National Farm Loan Association as the "front door" of the cooperative land bank system and explained that it is these associations through which farmers avail themselves of the system's credit services.

He pointed out that funds for loaning purposes are obtained through the sale of land bank bonds to the investing public, and that the bank's capital stock is owned "lock, stock and barrel" by the borrowers through their associations.

A report on the progress of the association during the last year, made by R. L. Strickie, secretary-treasurer, showed that the association has \$25,690.00 of capital stock in the land bank at Spokane; \$7,600.00 invested in government bonds and farm loan bonds, and has \$13,508.00 in surplus and reserves.

Chas. S. Dyer of Roseburg, and J. H. Parrott of Camas Valley were re-elected directors of the association. Holdover directors are Eugene H. Fisher and W. G. Truitt of Oakland; Emory Baker, Brockway and Lawrence Michaels of Canyonville.

Fisher, association president, presided at the meeting and introduced the speakers. The business session was preceded by a dinner and concluded with the showing of the film, "Banking on the Land."

Suburb of Mukden Captured by Reds

NANKING, Feb. 26.—(AP)—The mounting fury of Chinese Communist assaults near Mukden was regarded today as probably opening a direct attack on that Manchurian metropolis. Dispatches from Mukden said the battle for the suburbs of Sin-

min, 30 miles west of Mukden, reached a high pitch with government reserve air power thrown into the fight. Sinmin proper fell to the Reds yesterday.

Sinmin was one of three main defense points in the steadily weakening government-held area of Manchuria. Chiang Kai-shek's commanders divided their armies among Mukden, Sinmin and Tieling. Industrial railway city 40 miles northwest of Mukden.

Pro-government dispatches to Peking reported the Communists also had penetrated Tieling's suburbs. Savage fighting was reported at Fenki, coal center 35 miles southeast of Mukden.

Military observers described Mukden's situation as "desperate and rapidly approaching the hopeless stage." They saw little chance that the government could scrape up enough reinforcements to change the tide without dangerously exposing vital areas of China proper.

Meanwhile, Generalissimo and Madame Chiang returned to Nanking after two weeks in Kuling, summer capital. His prolonged absence led to reports he sought solitude to meditate China's civil war and economic crises.
