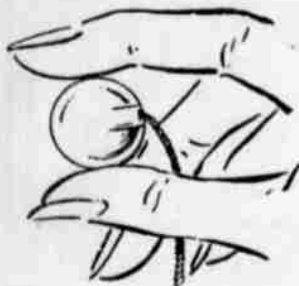

Medical Insurance Case Plaintiff Drops Appeal

ASTORIA, March 1.—(AP)—A test case on whether physicians must accept their fees from medical insurance groups won't be tested after all.

Arvid Pearson, Seaside logger, dropped his appeal in circuit court here. Pearson had been sued by Dr. Russell W. Pacher, Seaside physician, for a \$22.50 medical bill.

Pacher had refused to accept payment of the bill from the Hospital Insurance Group, which insured Pearson. The physician contended he could not be forced to deal with his patient through a "layman third party."

The physician won the case in Justice Court at Seaside, and the logger then appealed to circuit court.

Surviving are the widow, Mrs. Lena Parson, Sioux City; a son, Dorance W. Parson, Camp Lee, Va.; a daughter, Mrs. Frances H. Whitten, San Francisco; two sisters and a brother, Mrs. Frances Pritchard, Los Angeles; Mrs. Hulda Amundsen, Sioux City, and Asa Parson, Vancouver Island, B. C.

Parson's body was accompanied by his daughter to Sioux City for funeral services. Arrangements were in care of Stearns Mortuary, Oakland.

100,000 Stranded As Ferries Suspend In Rate Dispute

SEATTLE, March 1.—(AP)—An estimated 100,000 residents of the Olympic Peninsula and Puget Sound Islands were virtually stranded today.

The ferries stopped running at midnight or shortly thereafter. Capt. Alex M. Peabody, Puget Sound Navigation Company president, emerged from a meeting with Governor Wallgren shortly before midnight last night and said:

"We are going to start the orderly liquidation of the company at once."

The meeting between Wallgren and Peabody broke up after the governor proposed that the state join with the company in asking the Thurston County Superior Court to set aside its judgments pending a complete review of the case by the state's Department of Transportation.

"In a bull-headed manner he (Peabody) said he didn't want any more to do with the department," Wallgren said.

Wallgren said the offer would have permitted continued operation under its present 30 per cent temporary rate increase while the state department restudied the case.

The restudy, he said, would have taken into consideration 1947 operation figures presented by the company in court Friday. It also, he said, would have reconsidered some \$640,000 in refunds due ferry users.

The refunds resulted from a court decision affirming the department's order to cut the 30 per cent temporary boost back to but 10 per cent above rates charged Feb. 15, 1947.

Governor Wallgren said Peabody asked for an additional 30 per cent rate increase, in addition to the 30 per cent increase in effect. He asked also, Wallgren said, "that the refund of approximately \$640,000 be cancelled."
