Growth of 4-H in Douglas Noted in National Week

This week being "National 4-H Week," 4-H boys and girls in Douglas County are taking stock of their 4-H projects and talking over in their meetings how they are helping their club.

National 4-H Club Week, March 1 to 7, is dedicated to the youth of America and has as its theme this year, "Creating a Better Home Today for a More Responsible Citizenship Tomorrow."

Douglas County has at the present time 108 4-H Clubs, with a total of around 1,300 projects being carried by boys and girls. This number is growing constantly, said Frank Von Borstel, Jr., county club agent.

The kinds of 4-H work taken in Douglas County range all the way from livestock and gardening to sewing and canning, and there is at least one 4-H Club in almost every community, he said. Last year Douglas County 4-Hers raised 1,043 turkeys and chickens, grew 48 gardens, raised 194 animals, canned 5,896 jars of fruit and vegetables, made 796 garments and served countless meals. Many of the boys and girls won prizes at the state fair and one, Marjorie Zeller of Brockway, was chosen as one of Oregon's representatives at the National 4-H Congress.

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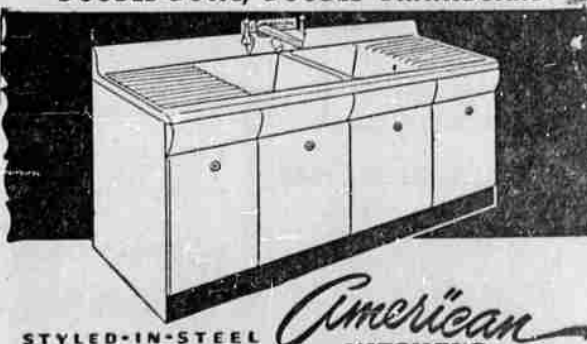
