A five-year penitentiary term was imposed on William Clifford Thiel, Roseburg, by Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly this morning, on Thiel's plea of guilty to a charge of obtaining personal property by false pretenses.

Corkrum Motors last year with a worthless bank check, changed his plea to guilty Tuesday. District Attorney H. A. Canaday said Thiel was indicted on the charge by the grand jury recently.
