FIFTH CONCERT TO BE PRESENTED ASSOCIATION EVENING OF MARCH 13TH

For the first time since the organization of the Roseburg Community Concert association, the members will enjoy their fifth concert in any one year, when the Salt Louis Sinfonietta, known as the little "symphony" and consisting of twenty artist-musicians, is brought to Roseburg Saturday evening, March 13, at 8:15 o'clock at the Junior High School auditorium.

Paul Schreiber, founder and conductor of the Sinfonietta, conceived the idea some years ago of creating a small body of players which would have all the refinements of the string quartet, but which would also include much of the gorgeous color combination and somewhat of the sonority of the full-sized symphony orchestra. Indeed, it was such an orchestra that played in the chamber of Prince Esterhazy in the 18th century, and was led by no less a personage than Joseph Haydn. Many of the nobles of that period maintained, as a matter of pride, a chamber orchestra, whose literature came to be known as chamber music.

These concerts have been enthusiastically received and acclaimed everywhere as filling a great need—bringing to colleges and cultural centers beautiful and seldom heard music written for the more compact instrumentation.

Miss Gladys H. Strong, president of the Association, and the officers feel that by bringing the Salt Louis Sinfonietta to Roseburg, they have secured one of the very best of all entertainments available for the members.

The March 13th concert will close the 1947-48 concert season of the association.
