Two Sub-Councils Formed in System For Apprentices

Two sub-councils of the Roseburg Apprenticeship Council have been organized recently, it was reported by Myron D. Johnston, Medford, of the U. S. Department of Labor apprentice training service.

The sub-councils supervise on-the-job training for apprentice carpenters and electricians, as part of the larger apprenticeship program in several trades and businesses here, Johnston said.

The sub-council for the electrical trades includes J. F. Pinard, chairman; Gene Hidenour and Ted Donnelly, representing employers, and C. R. Smith, secretary; Ray Simms and Ben DuFresne, representing employees.

The carpenters' sub-council includes Charles Polrot, chairman, J. H. Howe and John Todd, representing employers, and Jerry Moffat, Robert J. Caley, and Eldon Ode, representing employees, with Walter Dage, business agent for the Carpenters and Joiners Union, acting as secretary.

Johnston said that a sub-council may be set up for any trade in which 10 or more apprentices are being trained. Eighty-five per cent of the apprentices now enrolled are veterans receiving on-the-job benefits of the GI Bill.

Sub-councils may be formed soon for auto mechanics and sheet metal work apprentices.

Johnston said that a vacancy for an employer representative now exists on the Roseburg Apprenticeship Council. The council's membership includes Leo Kimball, W. L. Tozier and Charles Brundage, representing employers; L. F. Thorne, George R. Ware, John Cornilison and James A. Picard representing employees and George Foster, Roy O. Young and the Rev. Morris Roach, representing "the public."

Alaska Statehood Proposal Advances

WASHINGTON, March 5.—(AP)—Alaska cleared another hurdle yesterday toward statehood.

A bill which would make it the 49th state—unless Hawaii makes the grade first—was approved unanimously by a House territories subcommittee. It previously had been approved by a small subcommittee.

The bill, by Delegate Bartlett of Alaska, now goes to the House public lands committee, of which the territories subcommittee is a part.

The Hawaiian statehood bill, passed by the House last year, is now pending before a Senate committee.

The Alaska bill was amended to give the proposed new state approximately 42,000,000 acres of public land instead of 21,000,000 acres proposed by the Interior Department. It also would give Alaska the receipts from four sections in each township in the national forest and one section in the Tanana Valley.

Elevator, 60,000 Bushels of Wheat Destroyed by Fire

RITZVILLE, Wash., March 6.—(AP)—Fire of undetermined origin destroyed an elevator and 60,000 bushels of wheat 17 miles northwest of here.

The loss was estimated at \$250,000 by Ross L. Reiman, Odessa, manager of the Schoonover Elevator and Warehouse Company. He said the damage was covered by insurance.
