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Bears Picked To Trim U. O. Quint

BERKELEY, Calif., March 11—(AP)—Basketball fans in these parts are picking California as a heavy favorite over Washington.

They figure California's record in winning the Southern Division crown with only one loss gives the Bears an edge in the Pacific Coast Conference playoff starting tomorrow night, despite Washington's earlier victories over them. Washington beat California in Seattle in December, 54-51 and 59-42.

Zeb Chaney, assistant California coach, reported after scouting Washington against Oregon State Tuesday night that the Bears may be bothered by the Huskies' faster pace.

"Coach Nils Price was worried enough to send a scout north for the playoff game," Chaney remarked. "He does not agree with the critics who figure California will have a pushover."

The teams will play Friday and Saturday nights, with a third game Monday if needed.

Hall Wants Unity On Daylight Saving

SALEM, Ore., March 11—(AP)—Governor John Hall yesterday rejected a proposal by Portland's Mayor Earl Riley to call a conference of city, county and state officials to work out daylight saving time for Oregon.

"It wouldn't work out," Governor Hall said, "because there would be no way to get the opponents to conform."

"You might end up with two-thirds of the state on daylight time, and the other third on standard time. That would be just plain confusion."

"The state can't go on daylight time without an act of the legislature."

The governor said he hoped that the League of Oregon Cities, which meets at Enterprise next Monday, might work out a way for all cities to adopt daylight time and to make it binding on all cities. Then, he said, the rest of the state probably would conform.

Wreck Kills Man After Visiting New-Born Babe

WALLA WALLA, March 11—(AP)—Grover C. Westbrook, Walla Walla, was trapped beneath his overturned car and killed late Tuesday three miles west of Walla Walla.

Coroner Albert N. Bradford said Westbrook was returning to Richland, where he worked, after

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spending the day with his wife who had given birth to their first child.

Trained Dogs Bring Rescue to Trapped Man

GALESBURG, Ill., (AP)—Because W. E. Bloomfield's two dogs understood his command to "go call mama" he was rescued from beneath his automobile which pinned him down.

Bloomfield, 45-year-old farmer of nearby North Henderson, was jacking up his car when the back slipped. He was caught beneath the running board.

He shouted for help until hoarse, but his wife was washing clothes in the basement and did not hear him.

"Go call mama," Bloomfield told his dogs.

The dogs ran to the basement window and barked until Mrs. Bloomfield came out. Then they guided her to her husband. Unable to raise the car, she phoned a neighbor for help.

Bloomfield suffered only minor bruises and exposure.

Auto Plunge Drowns Youth, Pal Saves Himself

BAKER, Ore., March 11—(AP)—Samuel Earl Ratliff, Jr., 20, Baker, was drowned Tuesday night and a second youth, Ronald Boyd McGinnis, 18, also of Baker, escaped injury when the car in which they were riding missed a bridge on Highway 30 near Ontario and plunged into the Malheur river. The two were on their way to a dance.

Ratliff was caught in the car when it landed in the river, bottom side up. McGinnis was able to unroll a window and escape. He dived several times for Ratliff but was unable to dislodge him. State police righted the car and removed the body.

Coos Woman Gets Pay For Plane Crash Hurts

WASHINGTON, March 11—(AP)—A bill to pay Mrs. Eleonore M. Hannan of Coquille, Ore., \$1,101 for injuries received when a Navy airplane crashed into her home in 1944 has been signed by President Truman.
