

Wife Forced To Read Karl Marx Granted Alimony

MINEOLA, N. Y., March 11.—(AP)—Supreme Court Justice Thomas J. Cuff Tuesday granted temporary alimony to Mrs. Sally C. Shannon, who claimed her husband, Philip, "required" her to read and study the writings of Karl Marx.

Justice Cuff also wrote in his decision that Shannon, who is a counsellor to veterans at Columbia University, is an admitted Communist and that he testified she suggested Marx, Shannon read and study Marx, but did not require it.

The court's comments were included in a decision granting Mrs. Shannon temporary alimony of \$50 a week, custody of the two children and \$400 counsel fees.

Shannon started a divorce action in Suffolk county last December charging her wife with adultery. The case is still pending. In January Mrs. Shannon began the temporary alimony and custody proceedings.

The justice also directed Mrs. Shannon's counsel to bring Shannon's "political enrollment and belief to the attention of the authorities of Columbia University forthwith."

In New York City, a spokesman for Columbia University said the university "very recently was notified by Mr. Shannon that pri-

or to his employment by Columbia he had held for some months a membership card in the Communist party."

CIO Backs Congressmen Favoring Marshall Plan

PORTLAND, Ore., March 11.—(AP)—The executive board of the CIO International Woodworkers of America reported yesterday it would support Congressmen backing the Marshall plan.

The board, in a statement, said it planned a registration and get-out-the-vote campaign which "will result in the election of a progressive Congress." It opposed joining a third party.

The board commended CIO President Philip Murray for removal of Harry Bridges as regional director.

The IWA represents some 80,000 woods and mill workers.

Labor Unions Urge Removal of Taxes On Oleomargarine

WASHINGTON, March 11.—(AP)—The AFL, the CIO and other consumer groups urged Congress yesterday to end special federal taxes on oleomargarine.

Lewis G. Hines told the House Agriculture committee that 7,500,000 American Federation of Labor members favor bills to cut out what he termed the "discriminatory tax on margarine."

Hines testified: "If this congress feels true concern for the pocket books and health of millions of little people in America, if you really want to preserve free competitive enterprise, then here is a good place to start."

Speaking for the CIO, Donald

Montgomery suggested the House Committee on Un-American Activities could "look to the statute books and put an end to this outmoded and unjustified regulation of the manufacture, sale and consumption of oleomargarine. That legislation was un-American at its birth."

"Butter or nothing. That is the issue the butter lobby puts up to this committee," Montgomery said.

The House agriculture group is holding hearings on 18 bills calling for repeal of federal taxes on oleo.

Earlier the cotton council and retail grocers urged approval of such legislation. They said they are opposed to the levies for reasons of health and economics.

Holy Land Split Pact Nears Crash

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., March 10.—(AP)—The much-heralded U. S.-Russian agreement on Palestine partition appeared today to be crumbling.

A battle of words outside United Nations chambers yesterday spotlighted their current differences over the political future of the Holy Land. It was the sharpest split on the issue between the two powers since last November when they pushed the partition plan through the U. N. Assembly.

The core of the verbal issue was American insistence on bringing the Arabs, bitter foes

of partition, into United Nations consultations. So far the Arabs have boycotted every discussion of the split-up scheme. The Jews accept the plan to create Jewish and Arab nations by next Oct. 1.

The Jews oppose overtures to the Arabs. Russia has termed the moves worthless in view of past failures at conciliation.

A high Soviet source told newsmen yesterday the United States appears to favor re-opening the partition plan.

"Some persons seem to be hesitant about carrying out the assembly decision," he said tartly.
