us to be becoming weaker rather
than stronger.

For the first time in our exist-
ence, we are facing the historical
fact that NATIONAL SECURITY
overshadows all other issues.

THAT explains the spontaneous
and in America amazing Elsen-
hower movement. In Eisenhower,
we thought we saw the an-
swer to our problems.

But for reasons known only to
him, Eisenhower removed him-
self from the campaign.

KEEP your fingers crossed.
Don't go out on limbs with
predictions.

The Republican convention this
summer will be a gathering such
as we have never seen before in
this country. As to POLITICS, as
we have known politics in the
past, there will be a rebellious
undercurrent. There will be FEAR
—fear that if we don't do the
right thing the consequences can
be disastrous.

At such a convention, ANY-
THING can happen.

WE know we don't want war.
We THINK Russia doesn't
want war—yet. In spite of menac-
ing developments throughout the
world, we HOPE that war can be
staved off.

Still—
The path we are following is a
dangerous path. SOMEBODY'S
FOOT MIGHT SLIP.

HOW?
Well, we got a chilling look
at that in Vienna Monday. Three
American soldiers and three Aus-
trian girls were walking happily
along a sidewalk. In front of a
prominent hotel, a Russian sentry
ORDERED THE AMERICAN
SOLDIERS INTO THE GUTTER.
(The implication was that they
weren't good enough to walk on
the sidewalk.)

The soldiers refused. Whereupon
a second Russian sentry struck
one of them with the butt of his
gun, knocking him to his knees.
The Russian then fired a shot in-
to the American's back, and AN-
OTHER shot into his arm, smash-
ing his elbow.

The two other Americans—un-
armed, in accordance with Ameri-
can military regulations—and the
three girls then ran to the shel-
ter of an American-occupied ho-
tel two blocks away, with the Rus-
sians firing over their heads.

WERE a queer people.
We're so constituted that in
time of peace we won't support
an adequate military force. Yet
we resent, FLAMINGLY, an in-
dignity such as that in Vienna.
When we get mad enough, we're
ready to wade into a fight to the
death—AT A DISADVANTAGE.

It isn't smart. If we're going to
be non-military, we ought to be
HUMBLE. But we aren't humble.

ANYWAY, this Vienna business
gives you an idea of what
could happen. We all know some-
thing could happen. We're sen-
sible enough to know we aren't
prepared for it. This knowledge
keeps us nervous.

This nervousness will be pres-
ent at the Republican convention.
That is why anything could hap-
pen there.

Red Cross Drive Group to Report On Collections

Volunteer Red Cross campaign
workers in Roseburg will be bid-
den to a "report meeting" at the
Umpqua Hotel next Wednesday
morning at 8 o'clock. It was an-
nounced by Allen Clute, chair-
man of the Douglas County Red
Cross chapter.

Clute, he said, \$1,270.18 of a
\$12,000 local goal has been re-
ported collected in the current
Red Cross fund drive. The figure
is expected to show a marked in-
crease when more of the volun-
teer solicitors will have reported
their contributions.

Mrs. L. G. Twoby is directing a
force of 55 women who are sol-
iciting Roseburg's residential
districts, Clute said. Each woman
has been assigned a block, or a
group of houses, to cover during
the drive.

In addition, more than a score
of business men have been visit-
ing offices and mercantile estab-
lishments in the downtown area
to receive business and employee
donations.

No reports have been received
as yet from communities through-
out the county, where the Red
Cross drive is just getting off to
a start.

Congressional Investigator Target of Threat

WASHINGTON, March 12.—(AP)—
A threat to blow out the brains
of a congressional investigator
was reported to the house yester-
day.

Rep. Canfield (R-NJ) reported
the threat but did not say who
made it.

The investigator is Robert Lee,
who recently completed a study
of the internal revenue bureau
subcommittee which Canfield heads.
Canfield told colleagues that
Lee received telephone calls both
during and after the investigation
"threatening to blow his brains
out."

Lee blamed "screwballs" for the
threats.
He said he was sure they did
not come from anyone in the
internal revenue bureau.

"They're not made at me per-
sonally," Lee told a reporter, re-
ferring to the Revenue Bureau.
The result of his investigation
were made public Tuesday by the
appropriations committee. In gen-
eral, the investigator severely
criticized the Revenue bureau for
laxity and inefficiency.

Canfield's statement was made
during general discussion of a bill
appropriating funds for the treas-
ury and post office departments
for the year starting July 1. Can-
field accused the Internal Revenue
bureau of having misrepresented
last year's congressional action
in cutting bureau funds.

Russia Again Rejects Compromise on Austria

LONDON, March 12.—(AP)—Rus-
sia rejected yesterday three com-
promise proposals on terms for an
Austrian peace settlement.

The action tightened the dead-
lock among deputies of the Big
Four foreign ministers in their
75th attempt to reach agreement.
Official observers quoted Samu-
el Reber, the United States de-
puty, as saying the sincerity of
each delegation in seeking a pact
"can only be judged by the con-
cessions it makes."

"And," he added, "in the course
of the morning, all the offers
have come from the three western
delegations."

Gloomily, a British official ob-
server commented that, "in the
face of such stubborn stonewal-
ling (stalling) only a general de-
sire on the part of the western
deputies could account for con-
tinuing the discussions."

Trapshooting Crowned in Snowstorm

KANSAS CITY, March 11.—(AP)—
Ray Zwerner, of Klamath Falls,
Pa., Minn., held the interna-
tional flyer trapshooting cham-
pionship today, won with a 63 of
65 fired into a driving snowstorm.

Other scores included Cal Ray,
Eugene, Ore., 56, and M. W. Ray,
John Day, Ore., 52.

Seventy gunners competed in
the trapshooting of the inter-
state tourney's history.

title under Coach Nibs Price.

practice game decisions over
them early in the season. In fa-

ern Division title early. The Hus-
kies had to battle down to the
last and went into a one-game
playoff at the end of the regular
season to decide the northern
division race.

Friendship Train Gives Food to Needy Germans

BREMEN, Germany, March 11.—
A friendship train carry-
ing gifts of clothing and food
from four Northwestern States
and Alaska is starting its distri-
bution tour today.

The U. S. ship Getra Victory
brought in the gifts, approxi-
mately 3,000 tons, donated by the
people of Montana, Oregon,
Washington, Idaho and Alaska.

They will be distributed in the
American, French and British
zones of Germany and Austria.
Lt. Gen. George T. Hays, deputy
U. S. military governor of
Germany, said the food aboard
the ship would not measurably
alleviate shortages and distress
here. But he added that the most
important part of the cargo was
the spirit of good will.
