(Continued from Page One) by benefiting both labor and business.

"I have taken an active part on the public land committee of the Land Grant Counties. I was elected to the executive board at the organization of that committee in Eugene and served three years as its chairman.

"I represented the State of Oregon at the Regional Public Land Convention in Salt Lake City in 1943 and in Reno in 1946. I also attended and represented Oregon at the national convention in Hollywood in 1944 and in Salt Lake City in 1947, and accompanied Senator Gordon as a representative of Oregon at the annual convention of the County Officers of the State of Washington in 1945.

"I feel that the knowledge and information thus acquired will enable me to better serve the county in the future.

Better Roads Promoted "I have at all times directed my best personal efforts toward promoting more and better roads for Douglas County on a sound financial basis and have put forth my best personal efforts toward securing the designation of Highway 99 as a through strategic highway and attended all hearings of the Highway Commission in that connection. I am now serving as vice-president of the Pacific Highway 99 Association. It is important that Douglas County continue cooperation with this association as it is very helpful in securing additional construction funds, attracting tourists and home seekers.

"I assisted in the promotion of the Anlauf-Lorane Highway in 1938, which highway was taken over and assumed by the State in 1941, thereby relieving this county of the financial obligation of maintaining six miles of highway from Anlauf to the Lane County line.

"This highway serves as a detour when Highway 99 is closed by floods near Eugene.

"I have also been working continuously in an endeavor to induce the State to take over the North Umpqua Highway as a state highway and have considerable hope of success in the future.

"During the past two years I have been active as a director of the Northwestern Turkey Breeders Association, and during the war I served as supervisor of observation posts in Douglas County.

Stands Squarely on Record "Please do not understand that I am claiming the entire credit for all that has been accomplished by the county since I have been a member of the County Court. The other members of the court have labored equally hard. There has been the most splendid cooperation among the members of the court and all matters relating to county business have been carefully considered by the entire court. This has not been a 'Yes' man court by any means.

But George F. Cambell, president of the Illinois Coal Operators Association, retorted in Chicago: "We don't think we have violated any obligations. The fund is there. It is simply a matter that should be worked out by the trustees."

Foreign Aid Fund Resists Move to Cut

(Continued from Page One) sounding defeat suffered by Taft's fund cutting proposal insured Senate approval of the bill without major changes.

"We'll pass it by a bigger vote than we had against the Taft amendment," Connolly told reporters.

That would be a victory for Senator Vandenberg, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and chief Capitol Hill exponent of the bi-partisan policy.

Vandenberg stood his ground firmly as Taft led 22 other Republicans and eight Democrats in a roll call assault to batter the fund down to \$4,000,000,000. The Michigan Senator carried 23 other Republicans and 32 Democrats with him.

Taft Sees No Danger "Taft said the plan was justified by the world battle against Communism," all right. But he said it was "completely without economic justification."

"We may lose every cent we put up, but it seems to me there is a chance it will aid the battle against Communism," he said.

"The stakes are so large that I believe we should take that chance."

But he said emphatically that "this is no war measure." He said he did not understand President Truman's statement Wednesday that his faith in peace was somewhat shaken. Taft said he does not believe there is danger of war.

He warned that the recovery program will be a "serious interference with our own economic stability."

Meanwhile, the State Department announced it has started "informal" talks with representatives of the 16 western European nations on ways to speed delivery
