

Wrestling Feud Headlines Card Here Tonight

A re-match to end all grudges and feuds between wrestlers Joe Dorsett of New York City and Sammy Cohen of Brooklyn will be featured in the headline attraction of Matchmaker Don Owen's weekly mat card at the Roseburg Armory tonight.

Dorsett, the rugged Italian, will be risking his Pacific coast light-heavyweight championship in an effort to even the score with the Brooklyn "cover boy" who cut open a bad gash over Dorsett's eye and won last week's "grudge" battle on a technicality.

The inevitable rough-and-tumble is almost certain to pack the arena to over-capacity.

Owen has also arranged a sparkling supporting program, opening with a one-fall battle at 8:30 p. m., between Buck Weaver and Bob Cummings, a couple of top-fighters. The three-fall semi-final will send Gordon Hessel, sensational Pennsylvania newcomer, against fistic-minded Tony Ross of Salem.

Eton Owen will be the busiest man in the place—officiating all three bouts.

California Bears Defeat Huskies In Hoop Opener

BERKELEY, Calif. March 13.—(P)—The University of Washington Huskies, who almost turned the trick last night with their speed-ball strategy, met another whack at the California Bears tonight. This time they have to make good to stay in the Pacific Coast conference championship playoff.

A win tonight for the Huskies will call for a third and deciding game Monday. Otherwise the Bears journey to the NCAA playoffs at Kansas City next weekend on two straight triumphs.

The Bears kept pace with the Huskies last night and then outshone them in their own driving game in the last five minutes and won 64-51.

If Jack Nichols, the Northern Division's scoring record maker, gets away tonight the score may be in the Huskies favor. California's Chuck Hanger held him to a measly nine points in the opener.

But the Bears weren't able to choke off the long shots of little Bobby Jorgenson and the quick, driving shots of Sam White and Bill Vandenberg.

The Bears led 30-27 at the half after throttling down the Huskies' opening terrific fast break. Washington pulled ahead 42-38 in the second half but wilted five minutes before the game's end.

Washington started with a zone defense but switched to a man-to-man as the Bears jumped to a 14-9 lead. The Huskies caught up at 19-all and the score was tied five times before Gordy Cuneo of the Bears broke a 26-all deadlock with a spectacular righthand hook shot.

Guard Andy Wolfe of California was high scorer with 16 points. Vandenberg and White each had 11 for Washington.

Sponsored and coached by Chris Hestness, an old-timer in the Roseburg club, George went to the firing line with all the aplomb of a veteran, handling his 16-gauge shotgun with smoothness and skill. When he began dropping birds with fast shots over No. 2 trap, the word quickly spread, and gunners awaiting their turn at the club's snack bar rushed outside to watch from the observation porch as Brosi calmly counted 15 dead out of 25 birds.

He was far more calm than his proud dad and his voluble coach. Another youngster, 12-year-old Don Powell of Sutherlin, also is showing up well at the traps, and
