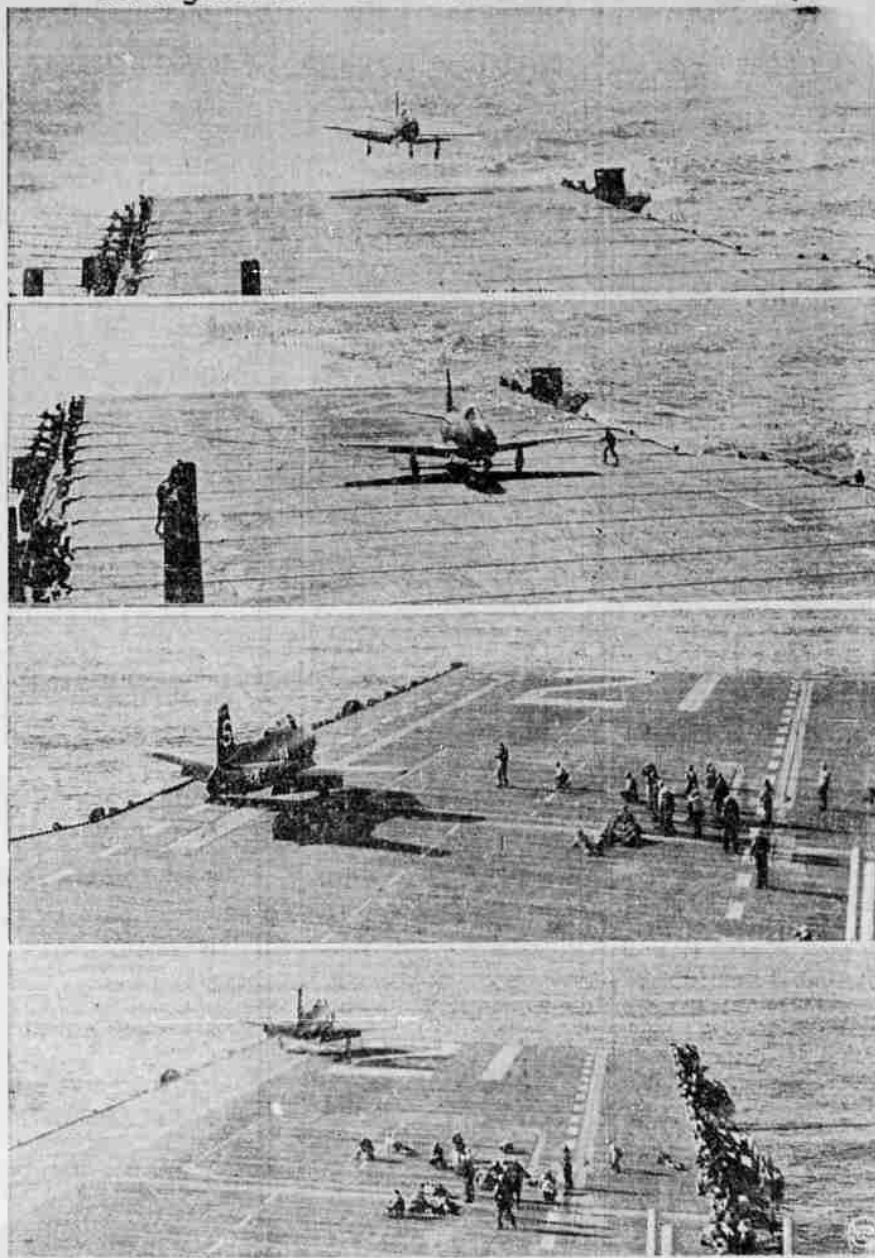

Jet Fighter Carrier Tests Make Aviation History



Operational jet propelled aircraft were landed and flown off a carrier for the first time March 10 when the Navy's newest and fastest plane, the North American FJ-1 "Fury" successfully completed its first trials, aboard the USS Essex off California coast. This dramatic photo sequence shows initial landing and takeoff, described by high officials as "marking the turn in naval aviation." Top photo shows Comdr. E. P. Aund, Houston, Tex., coming over the stern of the Essex and in second photo plane handlers rush out to disengage tail hook after a perfect landing, having caught the No. 1 wire. Note short length of deck used in bringing plane aboard. Landing speed was 105 knots. Third photo in series shows Lt. Comdr. R. M. Elder, Portland, Ore., ready on catapult for first flight off the ship, jet engine turning up full power. A moment later (bottom photo), plane has reached 130 knots speed and leaves deck after 95-foot run on catapult.

Only 150 Vets Of Famous Division Left to Carry On

FT. BRAGG, N. C., March 16. (AP)—If America went to war tomorrow, what veteran outfit does it have ready to throw a punch?

Well, there aren't many. One of the best is the famous 82nd airborne division, now back in training here at the "Cradle of the Airborne Force."

This "All America" paratrooper and glider unit represented the Army in the 1946 victory parade in New York City and claims more battle decorations than any other U. S. division in the Second World War.

It was an infantry outfit in the First World War and suffered 6,000 casualties in the Meuse-Argonne offensive alone. It had in its ranks such soldiers as a major called "Skinny" Wainwright and a Tennessee sergeant named Alvin York.

General Omar Nelson Bradley, now army chief of staff, commanded the 82nd before it sprouted wings as the first full-fledged U. S. Airborne division.

First Battle in Italy
Its men first "hit the silk" in combat when they parachuted down in Sicily in July, 1943, and the Germans immediately formed a grudging respect for "these devils in baggy pants."

In its next jump the 82nd was called on to help save the imperiled Fifth Army beachhead at Salerno. The "All Americans" leaped in to spearhead the Normandy invasion and were later rushed up to bolster the First Army during the critical Battle of the Bulge. They made their final jump in Holland during Marshall Montgomery's fruitless dash for the North German plain.

The swagging 82nd paratroopers ended the war with a record of having successfully completed every major mission assigned them.

Only 150 Remain
But how "veteran" is this famous veteran fighting division today? How hard a punch could it throw?

Certainly it is nowhere near its wartime fighting peak. Most of the old men are gone. There are only 150 combat men left who saw service overseas—and an airborne division numbers about 17,000 men at full strength.

Like the few other American divisions still activated, the 82nd has the job now of training thousands of youngsters. And it is busy also testing new equipment and
