

Religious Course Retention Advised

SALEM, Ore., March 16.—(AP)—A recommendation that weekday religious education in Oregon's public schools be continued pending clarification of a Supreme Court ruling has been made by the Oregon Council of Churches.

The executive committee discussed the issue here yesterday. Dr. Chester Hamblin, Salem pastor and council president, said the committee believes the court decision is not clear enough to warrant any changes in Oregon's religious program in public schools.

Many Oregon public school pupils are permitted to leave classes to attend a regular church-sponsored religious instruction class outside of the school building. In a few communities the public and parochial students attend joint schools.

Attorney General Neuner has been asked to rule on Oregon's situation as a result of the court's ruling against religious classes held in connection with the regular school program.

A series of conferences this spring on home and family religious education responsibilities was outlined by the committee. Dr. Hamblin said the council would intensify the church Sabbath school work.

Hospital Veteran at 20 Months

Little Lee Funk (above), son of Mr. and Mrs. Harvey Funk of Cleveland, is only 20 months old, but he's had a lifetime of hard luck. Soon after his birth, doctors discovered a blood clot on Lee's lungs. At three months X-rays showed a dislocation of the hips and his legs were placed in casts. Then he sailed through a hernia operation and an appendectomy and was sent home where, in quick succession, he came down with whooping cough, measles and chicken pox. Lee, pictured with his sister, Caroline, 6, returns to the hospital soon for another change of the plaster cast, and if endurance means anything, he'll be walking some day soon.

Support Fund Loss Threatens School

Failure to meet state standardization requirements threatens one rural school district in Douglas County with loss of a \$26,000 share of the state school support fund, Mrs. Lula C. Gorrell, county school superintendent, said today.

Declining to identify the district, she said an inspection was made last week by Dr. Dorothy Cook, assistant elementary supervisor of the State Department of Education, in which the school's standardization deficiencies were revealed.

Mrs. Gorrell explained that the deficiencies uncovered concerned the school building and its equipment and not with the teaching staff or curricula taught.

Under the state school support law passed in November, 1946, the principal of a "non-standard" school must submit a plan to rectify all deficiencies before the State Department of Education will approve state support funds for the school.
