PORTLAND, (AP)—A tree 50,000,000 years old is going to be planted in Portland. Seeds of the Metasequoia, a tree believed to have flourished

in a prehistoric age, were received here from Harvard for planting. Specimens of the tree, originally thought to have died out millions of years ago, were discovered in China recently. The climate in that part of China is similar to Portland's.

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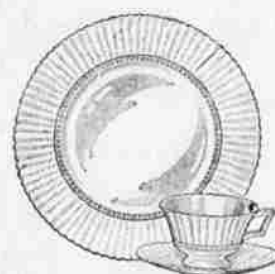
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
