

Military Power Must Back Words, Marshall Warns

WASHINGTON, March 18.—(AP)—Secretary of State Marshall told Congress yesterday that "diplomatic action without the backing of military strength in the present world can lead only to appeasement."

Marshall testified to the Senate armed services committee in support of universal military training and temporary enactment of a selective service law.

The committee opened hearings on these proposals only two hours after President Truman had appealed for them in a personally-delivered message to Congress.

Marshall said that in addition to these manpower measures "a reconsideration of our air program is also necessary."

He told the senators: "The combination of two things, enactment of the European recovery program on the one hand and a decision by the American people that clearly indicates that they are determined in their course, are necessary now, I think, to the maintenance of peace in the world."

The secretary of state expressed concern over what he called the "accelerated trend" of events in Europe, specifically mentioning the Communization of the Balkan states, except Greece, and the fact that both Hungary and Czechoslovakia "have been forced into complete submission to the Communist control."

He reminded the committee that within a month (on April 18) Italy will hold a national election. This, he said, "has an importance far beyond local Italian affairs."

"It will decide not only whether Italy will continue with its restoration into a true democracy. It will foretell whether the disintegrating trend to which I have referred may reach the shores of the Atlantic."

Food Ration Upped For Western Zone Germans

FRANKFURT, Germany, (AP)—British and American authorities announced yesterday an increase in the German food ration in their zones.

They said that, beginning April 1, Germans in their combined western zones would get a ration of 1,560 calories a day.

During recent months the ration ran as low as 1,100 calories a day in some areas, although the target was 1,550.

The joint announcement came as reports reached Frankfurt of new Russian attempts to win Communist votes in the Eastern zone with promises of more food.

Reports reaching German sources from the Russian sector said after the next harvest Prime Minister Stalin is expected to order the ration increased to 2,800 calories a day in the east.

Demo Aspirants For Senate Shy At Truman Label

NEW YORK, (AP)—The New York Times says a poll of 14 Democrats who will be running for Senate seats in 1948 shows that only three are "willing to stand up and be counted as pro-Truman candidates."

The Washington story by Clayton Knowles says that 13 of the 14 men questioned are incumbents, 10 from the deep South. The other is Secretary of Agriculture Clinton P. Anderson, who will seek the Senate seat being vacated by Sen. Carl A. Hatch of New Mexico.

Only three senators said they would stand for re-election as supporters of President Truman. They are Sen. James E. Murray of Montana, Sen. Theodore F. Green of Rhode Island, Secretary Anderson said that "I'm not running as a Truman Democrat but I certainly am a supporter of President Truman."

The story says that most of the Southerners were much more voluble off the record than they were for quotation and that "all were at pains, however, to duck the Truman label, because they either oppose the President personally or believe him an actual political liability."

Rent Control Board Members Ready to Quit

PORTLAND, March 18.—(AP)—Members of local rent boards will quit in a "wholesale" exodus if the House version of the Federal Rent Control act becomes law, the Portland Board chairman predicted today.

Cecil M. Gartrell said that under the House bill local boards would be deluged with cases from both landlords and tenants, requiring several days' work each week. Since the local board members serve without pay, they could not devote the necessary time, Gartrell said.
