ADULTS INVITED TO HYGIENE MOTION PICTURE MONDAY NIGHT

With no birds, no bees, no moralizing, a sound color film on human growth believed to be the first of its kind in the world, will next Monday evening be made available for showing to parents of children in the Roseburg schools at 8 o'clock in the Junior High School Auditorium. This picture is for parents only.

The film, "Human Growth," candidly presents the subject of social hygiene, as educators and social hygiene supporters have long sought, with a simple, scientific vocabulary and for the first time from a human point of view rather than in terms of animal life. This film is not only as educators like it but as parents and teachers have overwhelmingly approved after previewing in many meetings throughout the state.

It has the written endorsement of the Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers, the permission of the state department of education, and a warm welcome by teacher-training institutions particularly the health and physical education department of the University of Oregon. The E. C. Brown trust fund directed by Dr. Adolph Weinzirl of the University of Oregon Medical School financed the project, while Dr. Lester Beck professor of psychology at the University, planned the story and wrote the teachers guide which is a companion to the film. It is designed primarily for classroom use at the junior high school level, grades 7 to 10.

The picture will be brought to Roseburg next Monday evening March 22 by Dr. Weinzirl under the auspices of the Parent Teachers Association, the Roseburg Junior Woman's Club, and the Roseburg Woman's Club. It will be shown to parent groups also in the communities of Drain, Glide and Myrtle Creek, during that week.
