Salem moved to the finals with victories over Baker, 54-36, Astoria, 58-37, and then St. Helens.

**Lee Savold Knocks Out
Buonvino in 54 Seconds**

NEW YORK, March 20.—(AP)—Heavyweight Lee Savold today asked for a fight with Gus Lesnevich, the light heavyweight champion.

That was the immediate outcome of Savold's sensational 54-second, first round knockout over Gino Buonvino last night in Madison Square Garden.

Filling in as a substitute for Jo Baksi on 48 hours notice, the 32-year-old ring veteran from Patterson, N. J., registered the fastest main event kayo in the Garden's history. Baksi had been forced to withdraw because of a bad cold.

For the deflated Italian champion, Leon Earl, it was a bitter setback—his first after 11 straight triumphs in this country.

Savold was making his first ring appearance since last August, while the Italian had been established a 2 to 1 favorite.

**More Blood Flows In
Italian Political Riots**

ROME, March 20.—(AP)—One person was reported killed and 10 wounded near Naples yesterday when Communists fought young government party members.

Violence also broke out in Rome and other parts of Italy as parties speeded up their campaigning for the April 18 election. Communism is the prime issue.

**What Do These Titles Mean
To You?**

Just This: Several times a year most folks have reason to visit a jewelry store—whether for watch repairs, purchase of jewelry or other services. If you are like most folks you don't have considerable knowledge of metals and gems nor of the intricacies of watch-making, you must trust your jeweler's integrity. Unfortunately, some jewelry operators have taken advantage of their customers' lack of knowledge in these fields and "sold them a bill of goods". Consequently the honest jeweler is sometimes suspected of practices that unscrupulous jewelers have used. To overcome this an organization called American Gem Society was organized FOR THE PURPOSE OF DETERMINING JEWELERS WHOSE CONDUCT AND PRACTICES WERE ABOVE REPROACH. This title is not obtained by any hit-or-miss process.

The Registered Jeweler

A Registered Jeweler offers his customers unusual protection because he must pass rigid scientific examinations and because his store must be investigated and approved by the International Admissions Board and also the Regional Admissions Board in the area. These boards of the American Gem Society consist of retail jewelers with long established and unquestioned reputations for strictly ethical operation of their own business.

The proprietor or one or more salesmen must pass examinations on all deceptive names used for jewelers' merchandise and its quality.

He must pass the internationally established examinations in a fundamental knowledge of gemology—which is the science of gem stones, of precious metals, of jewelry and of silverware, and of the factors affecting their qualities and value.

He personally must pass a satisfactory examination in the actual grading of diamonds, passing upon their color, closeness to ideal proportions and comparative lack of imperfections—the factors which affect their value.

He must pass a yearly examination regarding new fakes, new methods of grading diamonds, etc.

He and his store must be re-registered every January 1st by the Admissions Boards which yearly pass on both.

Signs on windows and showcases protect the customer. These read Registered Jeweler—American Gem Society.

The Certified Gemologist

The Certified Gemologist must pass all of the examinations required of the Registered Jeweler.

In addition, he must pass four other examinations, preparation for which usually requires that three to four years' study be added to his practical experience. These examinations in advanced gemology include a knowledge of mineralogy, geology, physics, optics, chemistry, color, etc.

He must be able to distinguish scientifically between various genuine stones which look alike, but which may vary greatly in value, and to detect any sort of imitation or synthetic stone. He must have a complete knowledge of the advanced scientific methods of grading diamonds.

If he is in the retail business, he must be also a Registered Jeweler, and observe their rules. Therefore, he displays, in or on his windows, a sign reading:

Certified Gemologist
and

The title, Certified Watchmaker, is granted to those who have passed rigid examinations given by the Horological Institute of America (a Department of U. S. Bureau of Standards at Washington, D. C.) in addition to a minimum of five years' (plus schooling) at the bench. This title is different from the usual state license which must be given before anyone may practice watchmaking.

Mr. Alvin M. Knudtson is one of the few persons in THE WEST who holds all three of these titles. He is, at the present, the only Certified Gemologist in Oregon.
