SECRET POLICE. The communists rely upon control of the secret police to CONTROL FINLAND.

OFFICIAL dispatches from Athens to our state department in Washington (NOT just rumors) estimate that three divisions, or 30,000 men, are in an international brigade NEAR THE GREEK BORDER in Yugoslavia, Albania and Bulgaria. The state department says they are mostly Albanians and renegade Greeks WITH OVERALL RUSSIAN MILITARY DIRECTION.

IN this threatening state of world affairs, what are WE doing? Why, we're RUNNING A POLITICAL CAMPAIGN!

NEWSPAPERS on Friday printed the result of a Gallup poll on this question: Should we increase our military forces? Sixty-one per cent of ALL THOSE QUESTIONED were for increasing the army, 63% were for increasing the navy, 74% were for increasing the air forces.

IT seems fairly clear from this evidence that our people themselves ARE BRAVER THAN THE POLITICIANS.

INTERIM STUDIES

Two interim committee studies now in progress are expected to provide basis for interesting legislation at the next session of the Oregon State Legislature, which will be convened in January of 1949.

One legislative committee is making a study of state highway needs. The other is investigating wildlife management. It has become almost proverbial that legislative interim committees accomplish little between sessions, but studies now in progress by the two groups provide a definite exception from that rule.

The plan follows closely that of a similar study made recently in California where a long-range road construction program resulted.

One of the important recommendations expected from the committee will be that of financing. The information gathered shows need for many millions of dollars. Engineers will condense data gathered by the committee and make an estimate of cost. Ways and means of raising the needed money then will be studied by the committee preparatory to adoption of recommendations to be made to the legislature.

Suggestions for financing have been many. Some persons prefer a large bond issue, to be repaid out of highway revenues. The Douglas County court put itself out on a limb by opposing bond issues, but the majority opinion appears to favor bonds if no better method of financing can be found.

Another school of thought is that the state can spend only a limited amount of money each year, due to restricted availability of road building equipment, manpower, etc. If an attempt is made to contract more work than can be done with the equipment and men available on a competitive basis, costs will become too high, it is claimed.

We have no expectations that the work of the interim committee engaged in the game management study will satisfy all anglers and hunters. In our association with organized sportsmen of the state, we find them to be rugged individualists, each an "expert" in his own right.

Gabrielson, who perhaps knows more of the intricate fish and game organizations of the various states, will, we imagine, endeavor to aid the committee in setting up for Oregon a program which will embody all the best points to be found in the game codes of Pennsylvania, Michigan, and other states well known for the excellence of their game departments.

These two reports, translated into law by the legislature, should result in much improvement in both our state highway and our game management.

Observance Of Good Friday Urged By Mayor Flegel

Reminding that "too little of our time and thought" is devoted to worship and giving thanks, Mayor Albert G. Flegel in a proclamation issued today, called for observance of Good Friday, March 26, with prayer and deliberation "for the peace of the world."

The proclamation called in particular for devotion of the two hours between 1 and 3 p. m. as a period of "worship and meditation." At that time the churches of Roseburg will conduct a union Good Friday service at the First Presbyterian Church, with messages by local ministers to be based on Christ's seven last words from the cross.

WHEREAS: The world is in a state of unrest, and events of recent days threaten the peace for which so many lives have been sacrificed; and

WHEREAS: This nation, the United States of America, was created because our forefathers demanded for themselves and for their posterity the right to worship God in accordance with the dictates of conscience, and projected this demand into a new concept of freedom, liberty and democracy; and

WHEREAS: We thankfully and proudly profess our belief in the Christian Faith and its principles of peace and good will among all men; and

WHEREAS: Too little of our time and thought is devoted to acts of worship and the giving of thanks for the blessings God has bestowed upon us as a people;

NOW THEREFORE: As Mayor of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, I do urge upon the citizens of Roseburg prayer and deliberation for the peace of the world, and that, more particularly, the two hours from 1 to 3 p. m. on Good Friday, March 26, be devoted, insofar as possible, by the citizens of the City of Roseburg, to a period of worship and meditation.

Umpqua Forest Employees Assigned To Changed Duties

Supervision of tree planting, stand improvement and blister rust control will come under a new staff position to which Louis M. Gabel, timber sale officer at Tiller has been appointed, it was announced by M. M. Nelson, supervisor of the Umpqua National Forest.

A graduate of the Pennsylvania State College of Forestry, Gabel has been assigned to the Umpqua Forest for the past seven years, Nelson said. At present he is timber sale officer for the Cow Creek Ranger District with headquarters at Tiller.

Succeeding Gabel as timber sale officer at Tiller will be Leroy Bond, recent graduate of Oregon State College of Forestry, who has been promoted from a position as scaler.

Bond has been employed by the Umpqua Forest in seasonal work for the past eight years as a lookout and member of fire fighting crews. During the recent war he served as an Army captain.

Fitzgerald, who in the meantime had been hiding under some bed clothing in another room on the jail floor, used some bed sheets to make a rope, and escaped down the elevator shaft to the second floor. From there the rest was easy.

Fitzgerald was unaware that an order had been issued which would have set him free today. He was serving 60 days in the county jail on a charge of larceny in an automobile, and had served 31 days of the 60.

The escapee is on parole at present from Washington State penitentiary where he was sentenced in 1945 to five to fifteen years for second degree burglary. He has also served time in penitentiaries in Detroit and Jackson, Mich.

The price had remained steady for more than a week at about 450,000 to one. Most black market traders said the sudden change was because President Truman's speeches Wednesday did not include "one word" about China.
