SEA-LEVEL RECIPES FOR SEA-LEVEL BAKING

HOT CROSS BUNS . . . Fisher's Sunrise Special for Traditional Easter Breakfast

2 cakes compressed Yeast
1/2 cup lukewarm Water
1 cup Milk
1/4 cup Shortening
1/2 cup Sugar
1/2 teaspoon Salt

1 cup Water
2 Eggs
7-8 cups Fisher's Blend Flour
2 teaspoons Cinnamon
2 teaspoons Nutmeg
1 cup Citron, chopped

Crumble yeast and soak in lukewarm water. Scald milk. Pour over fat, sugar and salt. Add water and cool to lukewarm. Add dissolved yeast. Beat eggs and add. Sift and measure Fisher's Blend Flour. Reilt with other dry ingredients. Add 4 cups flour. Beat well. Add citron, mixing well. Add remainder of flour. Mix thoroughly. Place in bowl. Grease top lightly. Cover and let rise until double in bulk, about 1 hour. Shape into rolls. Place on greased baking sheet 2 inches apart. Let rise until double in bulk. Brush tops with mixture of 1 egg yolk and 3 tablespoons water. Bake 20 minutes at 400° F. Add powdered sugar to remainder of egg-water mixture and ice hands while warm. Makes 2 dozen.

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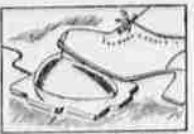
