THE EASTER MESSAGE

A world filled with sorrow, anxiety, suffering, hatred and death will celebrate tomorrow the religious holiday which normally is the most joyous of the year.

In the very land where Christ walked and taught, where He was crucified, and where He arose from the sealed tomb to bring hope to hopeless people, violence will be at highest peak.

Wars and rumors of wars continue to plague the world, even though two great wars have been fought in recent years to establish a permanent and lasting peace.

Yet, while man yearns for peace, his every effort to end persistent conflict has been futile throughout the centuries of history.

While statesmen and scientists promulgate international structures designed for peaceful living, only to have their societies, unions and leagues collapse, their missions unfulfilled, choirs singing their hosannas at Eastertide proclaim the pattern of peace.

In the Sermon on the Mount, Christ outlined the perfect plan for peaceful living. He told of a Kingdom in which men could—if they would—live in a state of brotherhood.

Every problem which faces mankind today in national and international relationships can be ascribed to failure of obedience to The Golden Rule.

Men have written millions of words in charters, declarations, edicts, constitutions, laws and regulations endeavoring to achieve the purpose wrapped up in the few words of that simple admonition: "Do unto others—"

Our Easter celebration centers around the theme of new birth—the hope and faith of eternal life. If men only would accept into their hearts and daily lives Easter's joyous message, giving new birth to spiritual life, we would have no more wars nor rumors of war.
