Contract bridge was in play during the afternoon with Mrs. Bailey, Mrs. Parr and Mrs. Moen winning the high scores.

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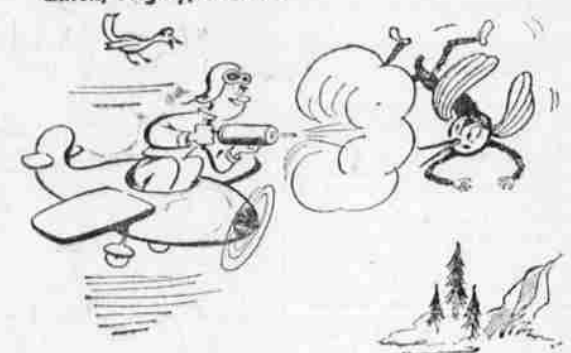
