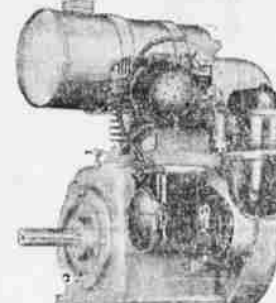

Yes, We Have No Hay.

For the time being, we have no hay to offer you. But we do have a good excuse this time. We are expanding! Member the old, old building across the street from the Mill? Where we have been distilling out hay, straw and litter for so many years? Friends, that building has a history.

At one time that old building was The Douglas County Flour Mill. It was moved from the present location of the Mill, to make room for the machinery and of our present building. Later, we added on the center section of our present home. (Before the writer came to Roseburg.) Next, the big south warehouse was added in the 30's.

In a couple days we will start wrecking the old building, but will build a modern warehouse, which will make it easier for you to buy hay, and for us to sell it to you. We will have enough room to carry a full stock of hay and litter of all kinds.

TIME MARCHES ON.
Can You Use Money?

Have you made arrangements yet to raise a few fryers? If you can utilize a vacant building, or fill up the brooder house that you usually use for turkeys, and won't this year, there seems to be a good chance for profits in fryers. Prices are going steadily higher, due to a short production nationally as well as locally.

Fryer prices have hit a half dollar a pound live weight in San Francisco, nearly that much in Los Angeles, and are going up in Portland right along.

In a recent fryer raising contest staged in California, fryers cleared almost 30¢ per baby-chick started, including every chick in the entire contest. Chick cost was \$12.20 per hundred, and feed cost was \$110.00 per ton, or \$5.50 a sack. Fryers sold at 35¢ per lb. for No. 1 and 30-32 for under 3 lbs. and No. 2 birds.

The prize winning pen cleared \$36.95 above chick and feed cost on 100 baby chicks. This entry averaged 4.13 lb. per bird. All fryers were sold at 13 weeks, and average of all heavy breed cockerels was 3.71 lbs.

In figuring your chances of making an honest dollar, it is well to remember that you can save at least 8¢ on your chick here at home; UMPQUA

CHICK STARTER costs only \$5.40; CHICK SCRATCH \$2.20; UMPQUA MILK DEVELOPING MASH now \$4.65; (may go lower); and Hen Scratch \$5.00. Further, you can expect to receive several cents more than the 35¢ per pound realized on the California test, since those birds were sold several weeks ago, before prices went up.

If you're working, why not put in a hundred or a home-made brooder, have all the fried chicken you want, put a few in the locker, and sell enough to pay the cost of the whole shebang? Could be done, y'know.
