The gift table was also decorated in pink and blue.

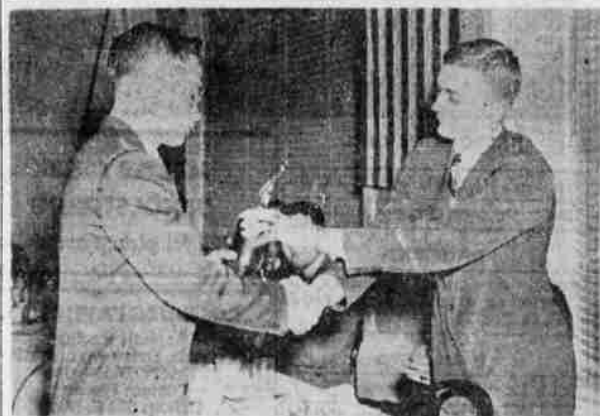

WASHINGTON, March 27—(AP)—Four, powerful, long range submarines are getting ready for their last voyage under the American flag.

Destined for Turkey as part of American military aid, they are now at New London, Conn. The subs were built in 1944, and are rated among the Navy's best. Eleven auxiliary vessels, also being given to Turkey, are waiting in the northern area for Turkish crews. Some 350 Turkish officers and men are now being trained in this country to take over the ships.

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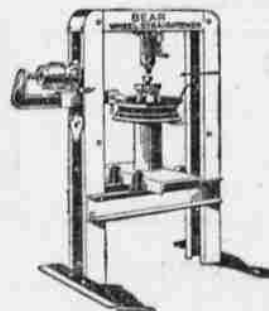
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
